## Cochran Is Only Yank Left in British Amateur

PORTRUSH, Northern Ireland (AP)—Graying Bob Cochran became the only American to make the last 16 in the British Amateur Golf Championship yesterday when he shrugged off the rain and decisively defeated two men half his age.

The 47-year-old St. Louis businessman — now the oldest player in the field — stroked his way around Portrush with faultless grace in appalling weather conditions.

He scored identical 5 and 4 victories over Brian Pitchford of England and Ian Meneely of Ireland.

An off line drive at the 16th sent Ralph Morrow of Oklahoma City crashing to defeat in the fourth round, 1-up to John McEvel of Northern Ireland.

This was a heartbreaker for the 25-year-old U.S. airman first class. It came after he scored the major upset of the tournament in the morning third round by eliminating Scotland's Reid Jack, 5 and 4.

Six Americans from an original contingent of 26 began play yesterday. Only two of them, Cochran and Morrow, survived to

reach the fourth round in the afternoon, and now only Cochran is left.

One of the biggest surprises of the morning came when Tim Holland of Rockville Center, N.Y., lost at the 19th hole to England's Brian Chapman. Holland had been among the favorites to take the title. He lost out when a short putt stopped on the lip of the cup.

Other Americans eliminated in the third round were:

Donald J. Dawson, Detroit, beaten 2 and 1 by Bill Pierce of England.

Major Hiram Snowden of Savannah, Ga., beaten 5 and 4 by John Duncan of Ireland.

### Blanchard Gets Command

LONDON (AP) — Maj. Felix A. (Doc) Blanchard, one of the U.S. Military Academy's all-time football greats, has received his first command in the U.S. Air Force.

He became boss of the 77th Tactical Fighter Squadron, based at Weathersfield, England. The squadron is a unit of the U.S. 3rd Air Force's tactical fighter wing.

### White Sox' Fox Plays In 700th Straight Game

CHICAGO (AP) — You can have your flag pole perchers, but for raw endurance, give us Nellie Fox.

The peanut-sized second baseman of the Chicago White Sox played in his 700th straight game against the Baltimore Orioles.

Long gone is the record by a second baseman of 477 games, set by the White Sox' Eddie Collins in 1914-1917.

The all-time record for any player is 2,130 games by Lou Gehrig. Stan Musial holds the National League mark of 895.

Omega Psi Phi scored 10 points in the broad jump when Sam Clayton soared to a first place with a jump of 19-7½. On an earlier jump Clayton reached better than 20 feet but he fouled on the jump.

Jerome Scott of Phi Gamma Delta took second when he jumped 19 feet, and not far behind him was Charles Whiteman of Tau Phi Delta with 18-9½.

Nixon Stuart copped the independent broad jump title with a leap of 18-11 and Dick Westrick was second with a jump of 18-2½.

Don Paxton of Beta Theta Phi and Jim Barton took top honors in the high jump. Paxton and Barton, an independent, cleared 5-9. Both attempted to clear 5-10 after the meet was over but neither could do it.

Mark Greenwald of Phi Sigma Delta took second place with a jump of 5-8. There was a six way tie for third place at 5-5 between Charlie Janerette (Alpha Phi Alpha), Clayton (OPP), Duane Ream (Delta Upsilon), Bill Booker (OPP), Scott (Phi Gamma Delta) and Tom Allan (Phi Delta Theta).

Dick Cunningham of Delta Sigma Phi nosed out Janerette for the shot put championship. Cunn-

ham won it with a heave of 41-4½, while Janerette took second with 40-1½. Ream of DU took third with a throw of 38-6.

Dave Robinson of Maple House won the indie shot put championship with a throw of 41-3½.
