

Single Rooms Forseen For Nittany Next Year

Nittany dorms will be mostly single rooms by the end of the fall semester, and Irvin Hall will be a men's residence hall for the spring semester, Otto E. Mueller, director of the Department of Housing, said yesterday.

Coeds who will be living in Irvin in the fall semester will be moved to fill vacancies in the other women's residence halls as they occur, Mueller said. The students who were assigned to Irvin have been notified of this situation, he said.

TIM Council To Function In Summer

A summer governing body for the Town Independent Men was rendered possible by a constitutional amendment passed last night by the TIM Council.

According to the amendment, terms of council members will run for one calendar year rather than the present academic year.

An additional provision will allow present council members to run for a seat even if they have only one semester remaining at the University. The requirement will continue to be two semesters for non-council members.

The quorum requirements were also changed so that TIM business could be transacted during the summer by the executive committee and a minimum of five council members. This group will not be allowed to make constitutional changes, however.

In other business, Ronald Lyon was appointed permanent TIM observer for SGA Assembly. Lyon will also visit Commonwealth campuses to discuss TIM with students there.

TIM also plans to run its bus to Whipple's the weekends during exams, weather permitting.

Van Tamelen to Speak

Eugene E. Van Tamelen, of the Department of Chemistry at the University of Wisconsin, will address a meeting of the Central Pennsylvania section of the American Chemical Society at 8 p.m. tonight in 112 Buckhout.

His subject will be: "The Total Synthesis of Colchicine."

Irvin, which has a capacity equivalent to that of three Nittany dorms, will be filled then, for the spring semester with those students who are occupying double rooms in Nittany.

Throughout the fall semester, as vacancies occur in the other men's residence halls, boys from Nittany will be transferred to fill those rooms. No student will be allowed to stay in a double room in Nittany if there is a vacancy elsewhere, Mueller said.

By the end of the fall semester it is hoped that Nittany will be mostly single rooms, said Mueller. This will afford greater privacy in the common facilities to be used such as bathrooms and telephones, he added.

Rates for the single and double rooms in Nittany will be the same but a student who is still occupying a double room after the first eight weeks of the fall semester will be given a refund, said Mueller.

The plan of moving students to fill vacancies will help to keep the dorms filled to capacity and will help to maintain the present board and room rates, Mueller said.

Nittany residence halls by this plan will be changed from a combined single and double room capacity of 1032 to a completely single room capacity of 564.

Frank to Give Speech At Dedication Ceremony

Maj. Gen. James C. Frank, of the U.S. Army Reserve Center, Harrisburg, will be the speaker for the dedication of Wagner Building, the military science building at 2 p.m. today.

The dedication program will include a review on the drill field near the building followed by a ceremony in the lobby at which the building will be formally presented to the University and also a plaque honoring the late Lt. H. Edward Wagner will be presented.

\$25 Fine Established For Evading \$5 Fee

Students attempting to evade the \$5 fee by not registering their automobiles will be subject to a \$25 penalty, according to the revised parking and traffic regulations.

Previously, failure to register a vehicle evoked a fine of \$5 for each offense. But this amount went out with free registration.

The summer session registration fee will be \$1 for a three-week session and \$2 for a six-week session. Parking permits for the summer will cost students \$1 a week including registration.

A full semester parking permit including the registration fee will be \$15 beginning in the fall.

Two-wheeled motor driven vehicles are included in the rate changes. The fees for these are one half the rate imposed upon automobiles.

Changes in the traffic regulations also reach into the realm of penalties for violations. Failure to report to the Traffic Violations office within 48 hours after a notice has been received shall result in disciplinary action, the regulations state.

Parking and traffic violation fines range from \$1 for the first offense to \$20 for the fifth and each subsequent violation.

Vehicles with permits and stickers may park (except from 7 a.m.
