

# The Gazebo, Hasty Heart Wind Up

Three final performances of "The Hasty Heart" will be given Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Boal Barn Playhouse. "The Gazebo," a comedy-mystery by Alec Coppel, is now running at the Mateer Playhouse.

"The Gazebo" tells the story of a harassed television mystery writer and is featuring Ronald Bishop and Patricia Thompson in the leading roles. The play is being directed by Max Fischer.

The Mateer Playhouse at Standing Stone is now selling special student tickets for its summer productions.

The tickets, which cost \$6, are good for admission to the remaining four plays on Monday or Tuesday nights.

The tickets will also be good for tonight's performance. They can be used for any seat in the house providing reservations are made in advance.

Tickets may be purchased at the theatre arts office in Schwab or at the Playhouse box office.

The Mateer Playhouse is owned and operated by the Department of Theatre Arts and is augmented by six equity actors.

The plot of "The Hasty Heart" at Boal Barn Playhouse revolves around a bitter young Scot, whose low opinion of his fellow men changes a number of times throughout the play. The changes in the Scot's attitude are due to sincere overtures of friendship made by men in his ward at a military hospital.

Comedy is interjected when Lochie, played by Jon Barry Wilder, ridicules the homelands of his ward mates calling, for example, America the land of the mickey "moose."

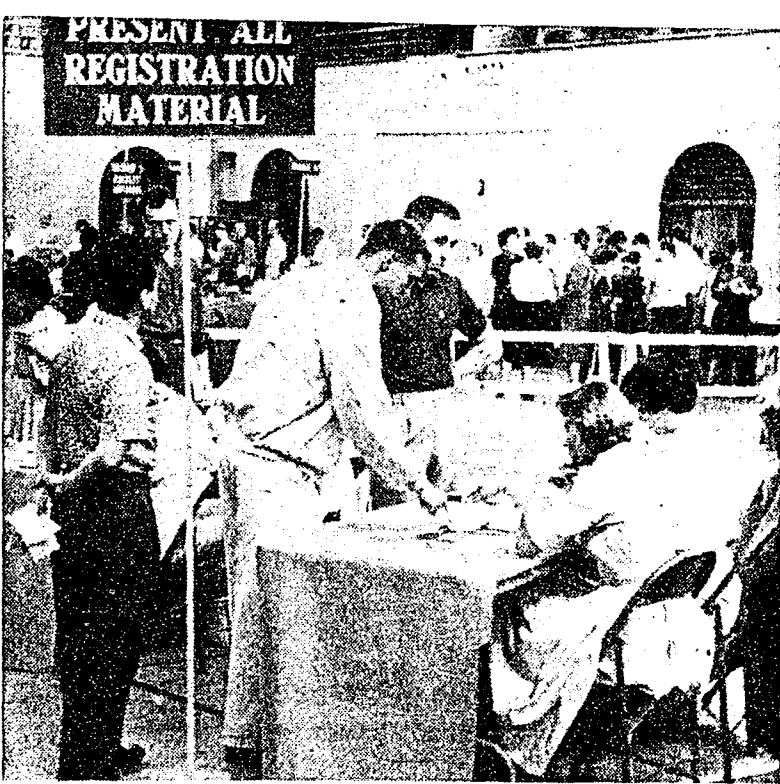
Yank, played by Joe Servello, causes some alarm when he jumps up and down on his bed reciting the books of the Bible.

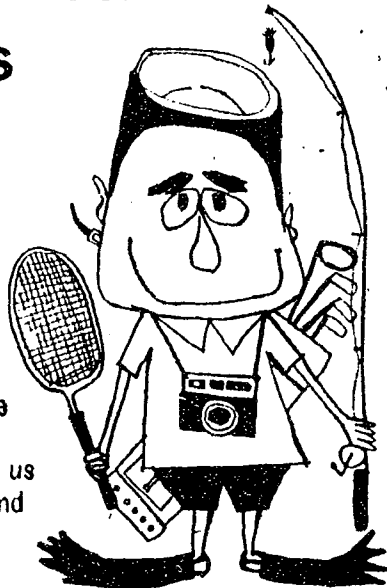

# Fraternity Report-

(Continued from page one) nual spring event, has been abandoned and replaced tentatively with a jazz festival.

The temporary assignment of transfer students, taking advantage of the University's concession in the policy requiring transfer students to live in the dorms, will place 114 men in 30 fraternity houses for the first two weeks of the fall semester. If the transfers do not pledge a fraternity within two weeks they will move to the dormitories.

Wise also reported that 64.8 per cent of the second semester male students who were academically eligible pledged fraternities during the spring.

Two fraternities are constructing new houses and plan to move into them next fall.

Zeta Beta Tau will move into its modern building on E. Fair-

mount Ave. at the start of the fall semester. Plans for the new Kappa Sigma structure, which is being built around the present house, call for completion in November.

Tau Kappa Epsilon added a \$100,000 extension last year and Acacia plans a \$200,90 addition next year.

Pi Lambda Phi, Omega Psi Phi, Pi Sigma Upsilon and Alpha Phi Alpha will move to other physical plants next year.

Statistics included in the report also showed that the fraternity men's average for the full academic year has been above the All-University men's average every year since 1950.

One fraternity—Kappa Alpha Psi—disbanded during the past year and another—Beaver House—gained a national affiliation with Delta Phi.

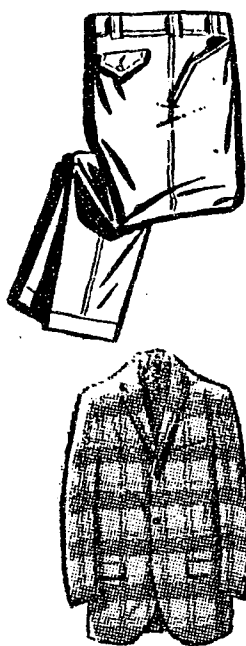

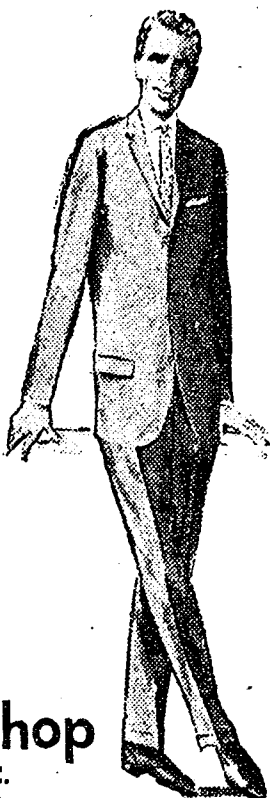
