

AL Team Announced For All-Star Games

BOSTON (AP) — American League President Joe Cronin yesterday announced the 22 players selected by manager Al Lopez to complete the 1960 AL All-Star squad.

The eight starting players were chosen previously by a poll among all players, managers and coaches in the league.

The All-Star games will be played in Kansas City July 11 and New York July 13.

Lopez named pitchers Gary Bell and Dick Stigman of Cleveland; Jim Coates and Whitey Ford of New York; Bud Daley, Kansas City; Chuck Estrada, Baltimore; Frank Lary, Detroit; Bill Monbouquette, Boston; Camillo Pascual, Washington, and Gerry Staley and Early Wynn of Chicago.

Catchers Elston Howard, Yankees, and Sherm Lollar, White Sox were selected to back up starter Yogi Berra, also of the Yankees.

Reserve infielders are Luis Aparicio and Nelson Fox of the White Sox; Vic Power, Indians, and Brooks Robinson and Jim Gentile of the Orioles.

Ted Williams of the Red Sox was named to a reserve outfield role along with Al Kaline, Tigers; Harvey Kuenn, Indians, and Al Smith, White Sox.

The eight starters named earlier are Berra, Bill Skowron, New York, 1b; Pete Runnels, Boston, 2b; Ron Hansen, Baltimore, ss; Frank Malzone, Boston, 3b; Minnie Minoso, Chicago, lf; Mickey Mantle, New York, cf; and Roger Maris, New York, rf.

Two Lions Miss Olympic Berths In Final Tryout

Ed Moran finished fourth in a field of 14 for the 1500 meters at the Olympic tryouts at Stanford University, Saturday. The Penn State grad student faded in the homestretch, and in a photo-finish lost his third place position that would have won him a berth on the Olympic team. Quantico's Pete Close grabbed the berth.

Steve Moorhead, another Lion thincad placed eighth in the 3,000 meter steeplechase and also failed to qualify for the trip to Rome.

Moran lunged for the wire at the finish and fell onto the track, just as Quantico's Close nipped him for the qualifying third place. Results of the finish were not available to the crowd until the photo could be examined by the judges.

Dyrol Burleson, the Oregon sophomore, won the metric mile in 3:46.9. Jim Grelle, former Oregon teammate, placed second with 3:47.4. Close and Moran clocked identical times at 3:49 flat.

Moran ran a strong race. In the backstretch it looked like Moran would place in the top three.

In the final turn Burleson and Grelle moved to the front, but Moran still looked sure to cop third place.

Quantico's Pete Close appeared in the last 70 yards, and Moran tried to rally as the Marine closed in. Close got the edge as Moran's lunge carried him to the cinders. The top three, Burleson, Grelle and Close, will compete in the Rome Olympics in August.

U.S. Team Named For Davis Cup

U.S. Linksman Hold Slim Lead In British Open

Associated Press Sports Writer ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP)— Veteran Gene Sarazen and young Arnold Palmer hung on to lead a thin American line through the qualifying test for the centenary British Open Golf Championship yesterday.

At the same time, the defending champion, Gary Player of South Africa, marked himself as a man who may require a lot of beating in the 72-hole tournament, beginning today. The South African added a 68 to a previous 67 for the qualifying medalist prize at 135.

Sarazen, the 53-year-old star of sport's golden era, surprisingly led the U.S. contingent by shooting an even par 72 on the New Course after an opening 69 for 141.

This put him a stroke better than Palmer, who skyrocketed to a 75 for 142.

The Latrobe, Pa. pro is co-favorite for the title with Player and Peter Thomson of Australia, a four-time winner. Thomson shot a 72 for 141 yesterday. This tied Sarazen.

Only two other Americans survived the cutoff at 147 or better which reduced the field to 74.
