

AEC Grant To Support Laboratory

Under a \$51,762 grant from the Atomic Energy Commission, University scientists will conduct research on high temperature materials and hope to build up a cooperative laboratory where basic phase equilibrium and property studies can be conducted.

One project, for which \$32,346 has been allocated under the grant, will involve high temperature—high pressure physical property measurements. It will be under the joint direction of Dr. M. E. Bell, professor of geophysics; Dr. Rustum Roy, professor of geochemistry; and Dr. Christopher Crowe, assistant professor of geophysics.

The project will be designed to develop facilities for measuring resistivity and other properties of materials under high pressures and temperatures.

While the actual measurements for which the laboratory will be equipped are not unique for scientific research, the particular combination of possible measurements under these temperatures and pressure extremes in one laboratory will be unique.

Atomic Shelter Construction To Be Examined At Seminar

A seminar on the architectural and engineering planning aspects of atomic shelters, the first of its kind ever held, will take place on campus from July 10 to 22.

The seminar will be directed by Gifford H. Albright, assistant professor of architectural engineering and director of the shelter research and study program, and Allen F. Dill, assistant professor of architectural engineering.

Morning and afternoon sessions will be held each day for two weeks in the North Wing of Sackett.

James E. Roembke, shelter design officer of the Office of Civil Defense Mobilization, will explain the national shelter policy at one of the meetings.

Other guest speakers will be L. N. FitzSimmons, research engineer for OCDM, and William L. Ostrowski, civil defense official of the American Chemical Society.

Albright, Dill, and three other University personnel will also instruct during the seminar. They are Albert H. Jacobson, Jr., assistant dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, Melvin W. Isenberg, associate professor of architectural engineering, and Robert M. Barnoff, assistant professor of civil engineering.

Among those attending the seminar will be two officials of the Atomic Energy Commission,

two men from the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, one from the National Institute of Health and three from other universities.
