

Lumumba Asks Date For Troop Removal

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Premier Patrice Lumumba of the Congo said yesterday he asked UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold to set a deadline for Belgium to withdraw its troops from the Congo.

He said Hammarskjold assured him he would spare no effort.

'K' Seeks Break In Arms Snag

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev suggested yesterday that the next session of the U.N. General Assembly try to break the East-West deadlock on disarmament, Tass news agency said.

Khrushchev, in messages to British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, denounced the Western powers for "empty talk" in the 10-nation Geneva disarmament talks.

The United States filed a formal request last Friday that the 82-nation U.N. Disarmament Commission be called early in August to take up the disarmament deadlock.

The Soviet Union already has proposed that disarmament be put on the agenda of the U.N. General Assembly which meets in September.

Diefenbaker and Macmillan had sent their letters before the United States made its request.

The two prime ministers asked for renewed East-West negotiations.

Lumumba told a news conference it was "in this spirit" the secretary-general would negotiate with the Belgian government in Brussels.

Hammarskjold leaves New York tonight and will stop in Brussels tomorrow en route to Leopoldville in the Congo.

Lumumba, answering questions, did not make clear whether Hammarskjold agreed to set an exact deadline for Belgian withdrawal as the Premier had asked.

Hammarskjold announced earlier he is going to Brussels for discussion with the Belgian government and to Leopoldville for an on-the-spot survey of the Congo.

Asked how he planned to solve the problem of the secession of Katanga province, he said: "There is no Katanga problem. There is only the problem of the withdrawal of the Belgian troops."

Lumumba said L. Edgar Detwiler, American financier, has no 50-year contract for exploitation of Congolese resources as he has claimed. The Premier explained that there was only an agreement in principle and that a contract could be signed only after an investigating commission and the Congo Parliament had approved that agreement.

Troops, Police Quell Uprisings In S. Rhodesia

BULAWAYO, Southern Rhodesia (AP) — Troops and police sealed off native townships last night after two days of rioting and a strike against white rule.

So far police have not used bullets against native rioters in this commercial and industrial center of 52,000 people. But ground and air forces have used tear gas.

Police engaged in a club-swinging battle with native mobs in the afternoon and were forced to withdraw.

More than 2000 troops and police, both black and white, surrounded the native quarters, which were ablaze with fires as rioters burned cars and houses.

Police, backed by white British troops, quelled a riot of several thousand Africans Sunday night.

Monday morning Negro agitators moved into white suburbs of Bulawayo—which means "place of the killing" in the native language—and persuaded many Negro servants to quit their jobs.

White attendants also were put to work at some gasoline stations where Negroes usually man the pumps.

Seventy-two Negroes appeared in court Monday on charges of taking part in riots. They were ordered held until Aug. 8 for trial.

Gov. To Map Campaign Plans

HARRISBURG (AP) — Gov. David L. Lawrence, refreshed after a post-convention rest, returned yesterday to take on the task of mapping Democratic strategy for the upcoming presidential election campaign.

The governor, with State Chairman John S. Rice, will work out strategy in the coming weeks to accomplish that goal and to elect a Democratic Legislature and the party's candidate for auditor general and state treasurer.
