The Class of '61 immediately established the \$200 scholarship which they offered to the first student accepted under the new program.


The class financed the award through student government funds designated for special proj-ects in an effort to encourage interested and qualified students to take advanage of the opportunity


to study abroad. The class did so with the hope of that each succeeding junior class will continue the annual scholarship.


