# AP Picks Syracuse To Retain Grid Title

Syracuse, generally regarded as the national collegiate football champion a year ago, will repeat in 1960.

That is the preseason opinion of the 48-man panel of experts who vote this year in the weekly Associated Press top ten poll.

Twenty-six of them rated Coach Ben Schwartzwalder's Orangemen the best in the country. Twenty-one named Mississippi and one favored Washington.

Giving 10 points for first, nine for a second place vote, etc., the Cotton Bowl champions garnered 446 points. Mississippi was second with 426 and Washington third at 345.

Each of the experts named Syracuse on his ballot, none lower than seventh. Mississippi was listed on 47 tickets.

The voting was scattered among 38 colleges and a second ten is made up of Texas Christian with 54 points, Auburn 51, Georgia 48, Northwestern 41, Iowa 33. Ohio State 29, Notre Dame 26, Tennessee 23 and Penn State and Arkansas with 20 each.

Last year Syracuse romped through 11 opponents, including Texas in the Cotton Bowl, and led all collegiate elevens in both offense and defense.

Three-fourths of the No. 1 backfield returns for the coming campaign but the awesome line, known as the sizable seven, has been reduced to three by graduation. Ernie Davis is the hero of the ball carriers.

Mississippi, 21-0 victor over Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, suffered heavy graduation losses but quarterback Jake Gibbs is back as is end Johnny Brewer, regarded as one of the country's best flankers. Dick Price, a 212-pound guard, also is considered All-American material.

Washington's hopes are pinned on Bob Schloredt, a quarterback who is blind in one eye. Despite this handicap he hit 52 per cent of his passes last season and then made Wisconsin see double in the Rose Bowl, 44-8.

Penn State's 1960 football team, says coach Rip Engle, will have "adequate size." The line will average approximately 210 pounds, the backfield 184.
