Thespians Need Runyon Types For Fall Show

The Penn State Thespians are looking for gangsters, confidence men and all types of Damon Runyon characters for their fall production of "The Big One."

Tryouts for the musical comedy will be held from 7-9 p.m. tomorrow, Monday and Tuesday in 100 Carnegie. The show will be presented Oct. 27, 28 and 29 in Schwab.

"The Big One," written by Gilbert Aberg, director of radio and television productions for the Department of Public Information, is a play which concerns a confidence gang that sets up a fictitious college on Long Island where it carries on "business" undercover.

The male and female leading roles of the play are those of Leo and Lilly. Leo is the "brain" behind the whole college idea, and is a little above the rest of the group in intelligence and character.

Lilly becomes the dean of women at the college, and she sings several solos in the show.

Another important role in the play is that of the Jewish rabbi who is a confidence man. All the members of the gang receive administrative positions in the college, and the rabbi becomes an instructor of Christian ethics.

There are parts of the play for singers, dancers and actors.

Harshbarger To Speak At Schwab

Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University Chaplain and Coordinator of Religious Affairs, will speak at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab at the first Chapel service. The subject of his sermon will be "The Worth of Knowledge."

Harshbarger, a graduate of McPherson College, received a B.D. degree from Yale Divinity School in 1942 and a D.D. degree from Juniata College in 1955. In 1953 he was awarded the Officer's Cross of Merit by the Federal Republic of Germany for service to prisoners of war in Great Britain and the Continent.

In addition to teaching a course in religion entitled "Basic Ideas of Western Religion," Harshbarger is a Post Doctoral Fellow of the National Council of Religion in Higher Education; a member of the Committee on Education and Religion of the American Council in Education; and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Church Society for College Work.

Last year, while spending a sabbatical leave in study and research at Cambridge University in England, Harshbarger also visited universities in England and Germany and participated in consultations on "The Meaning of Secularism" sponsored by the World Council of Churches. In Strasbourg, he was program coordinator for the World Student Christian Federation Conference.

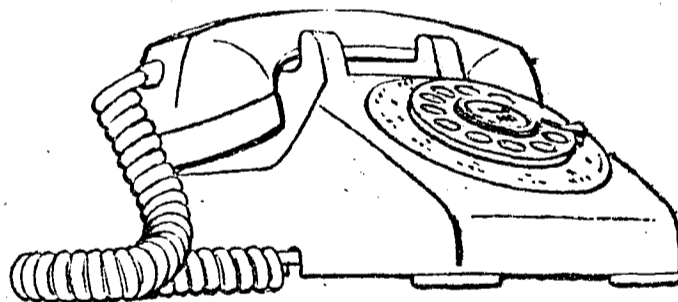
