



Communities to Become Main Centers of Activity

Communities and areas—these two terms are rapidly becoming everyday jargon here at the University. But exactly in what capacity does each serve?

A "community" is the product of a newly initiated system of grouping residence halls together for social, recreational, cultural and governmental purposes. There are seven communities on campus, five housing and/or providing meals for both men and women students, one housing only women and one housing only men. Community "A," including the West Halls, houses 350 women and 1200 men; Community "B," including the North Halls, houses 1144 men; Community "C" is composed of Atherton Hall, housing 500 women, and about 200 active members of Town Independent Men living in town but eating meals in Atherton Community

"D" contains 500 women living in McElwain and 225 men residing in Pollock C.

Community "E" includes Simmons Hall, 500 women, and Pollock B, 225 men; Community "F" is composed of Pollock 2, 3, 4 and 5, housing 1000 women and a combination of Pollock A and Nittany, housing 1200 men; Community "G," composed of the South Halls, houses 1000 women.

The term "area" refers to that part of each community which concerns solely men or solely women. Thus, using Community "F" as an example, Pollock 2, 3, 4 and 5 would compose the women's area, while Pollock A and Nittany would form the men's area.

Radio Leaders Plan Student Networks

A student operated radio network of national scope is the ambitious plan of 20 leaders in the radio field who will meet here Sunday.

All are members of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters Committee on Live Radio Network, working to establish four regional networks which would be consolidated to cover the nation.

On Monday, the Eastern Regional Network committee will meet to consider further steps in the development of the region with which Penn State is associated, through WDFM.

The national committee, chaired by Al Fredette, of Albany Medical College, includes Harold E. Hill, administrative vice president of the NAEB; Richard Vogl, Iowa State University; Larry Frymire, Michigan State; Hartford Gunn, Lowell, Massachusetts, Institute; and Carl Menzer, Iowa University.

Dr. Harold E. Nelson, associate professor of speech and general manager of WDFM,

pointed out that eastern networks alone could serve about 45 million people, broadcasting many programs not now available from colleges and universities and other educational units.

The University, he added, is connected with the eastern region as it picks up WNYC, the municipal station in New York City. This is relayed to campus through two other stations. "We cannot, however, relay live programs back, but we do send them tapes," he said.
