

# National Radio Network Will Include Penn State

The University may prove to be an important link in the operation of a proposed national collegiate radio network, according to Dr. Harold E. Nelson, associate professor of speech.

Nelson coordinated plans for a meeting of the National Association of Educational Broadcasting Committee on Live Radio held this week at the University. At the meeting plans were discussed for the continued progress of the Eastern Regional Radio Network and the eventual linkage of four regional networks to cover the country.

Nelson, who is also general manager of WDFM, expressed hope that the University could play a valuable part in the eastern as well as the national network.

Nelson said that plans are rapidly developing to link educational stations in Canada with those in the New England states, New York, Pennsylvania and the District of Columbia.

To the west, the schools of the Big Ten and the University of Chicago are well on their way toward consolidating into a regional network which, it is hoped, will eventually be linked with networks from the Rocky Mountains and Pacific states.

Thus, Nelson said, by linking all four networks, college students all over the country will be able to exchange ideas, educational entertainment and information.

The members present at the meetings represented stations from eight states and the District of Columbia.

Among the resolutions passed at the week were:

● To have the University define the objectives of the uses for the proposed wider-coverage radio station.

● To determine, by survey, the equipment, locations and other technical requirements that will be necessary to implement the objectives.

● To consider other Commonwealth institutions as a source of program materials and technical assistance in the service.

Nelson said that, with the growth of popularity of the FM stations, college stations will be able to serve large city audiences.

# Structure Of AWS to Be Reorganized

The Association of Women Students last night reviewed plans for the reorganization of women's government at the University.

The name Women's Student Government Association was officially changed to the Association of Women Students last week. The AWS represents a broadening of function and a revision of structure of the former WSGA.

Information concerning AWS Senate and Council positions and a scheduled procedure for elections will be compiled by AWS officers tomorrow, it was announced.

Under this new governmental system, a basic plan for the five communities in which women are residing will include four primary levels of governing bodies.

Within each of the residence halls of a community, Unit Committees will be formed under the guidance of the senior resident. These committees will aid in the development of social, cultural and recreational activities in the residence halls.

Chairmen of each of these unit committees will provide representation to standing council committees which will have corresponding titles, social, cultural and recreational.

Chairmen of the standing council committee will be non-voting representatives to the next body, the Community Council.

A Community Council will be organized in the five communities where women are residing to provide local government for the community.

# Many Phone Users Dial Wrong Number

"Sorry, wrong number" became the popular telephone response of secretaries in various administrative offices across campus during the past week.

In placing on-campus phone calls, many people were dialing the letter designation, UN, of the University telephone exchange, according to Henry Yeagley, director of maintenance and utilities.

By adding the letter designation, UN, to the normally correct 5-digit dialing procedure, these people were connected with numbers other than ones desired, he said.

Yeagley explained the mixup as follows: In dialing a University phone number, for example UN 5-4801, it is only necessary to dial the digits 5-4801. However, when people mistakenly dial the UN designation, the letters U and N register as numerical digits on the operator's switchboard. Therefore, he said, a new phone number is formed, and the caller receives a wrong connection.

According to Yeagley, the numbers most often received by persons dialing the UN letter designation were within the 5-8600 series. He said that, in most cases, these numbers were assigned to administrative offices. Only about 192 students had phone numbers in this series, he said.

All the phone numbers registered in this numerical category, Yeagley said, have been temporarily changed. The new numbers will be effective until the Bell Telephone Company is able to devise a system whereby a person who mistakenly dials the UN designation will not be connected with a wrong number.

Yeagley said that the University will reassign phone numbers at that time and will notify all persons affected by the mixup.

He explained that under the present changes, no one will lose calls. All mistakes in dialing will be picked up by the switchboard operators, who will inform callers of changed numbers.

# Panhel to Give Rush Counsel

Panhellenic student counseling for rushees will be available during the entire period of chatter dates.
