

4-Term Year--

(Continued from page one) will remain about the same as now provided during two semesters. For example, a student carrying 10 credits for three terms would earn the same 30 credits as he would at 15 credits per semester.

Another major change initiated under the new plan is the elimination of the final examination period. All examinations during and at the end of each term will be conducted during the regularly scheduled class periods.

According to the report issued by Walker, departments are to begin immediately converting their curriculum organizations from eight semesters to twelve terms and adapting courses, lectures, recitations and laboratory sessions to the 10-week schedule.

The report delegates to the individual departments the job of offering a sufficiently wide range of courses in the summer term, to attract undergraduate and graduate students to enroll.

Under the four term plan the 1961-62 academic year will run as follows: the summer term will extend from June 15 to Aug. 24, followed by a fall term

from Oct. 2 to Dec. 12. Thanksgiving will be a one-day recess on the calendar.

The winter and spring terms will extend from Jan. 3 to Mar. 13 and Mar. 21 to May 31 respectively. Easter recess will begin Friday, April 21 through Sunday, April 23.

Classes will resume again for the summer term on June 14 and will run to Aug. 23.

The new plan, Walker explained, will make it possible for a student to graduate in three calendar years. Make-up work also can be done in shorter, less costly sessions. Students who interrupt their studies for financial or health reasons will be able to re-enter at more frequent periods, he added.

TIM to Hold Elections

Self-nominating blanks for positions on the Town Independent Men's Council are now available at the Hetzel Union desk.

TIM Council elections will be held Thursday and Friday. Any town man with a 2.0 All-University average and at least two semesters remaining at the University is eligible for office.

Stipends Available To Potential Profs

Nominations for the awards, which provide stipends of \$1500 for living expenses plus full tuition and family allowances, are made by University faculty members. Closing date for nominations is Oct. 31.

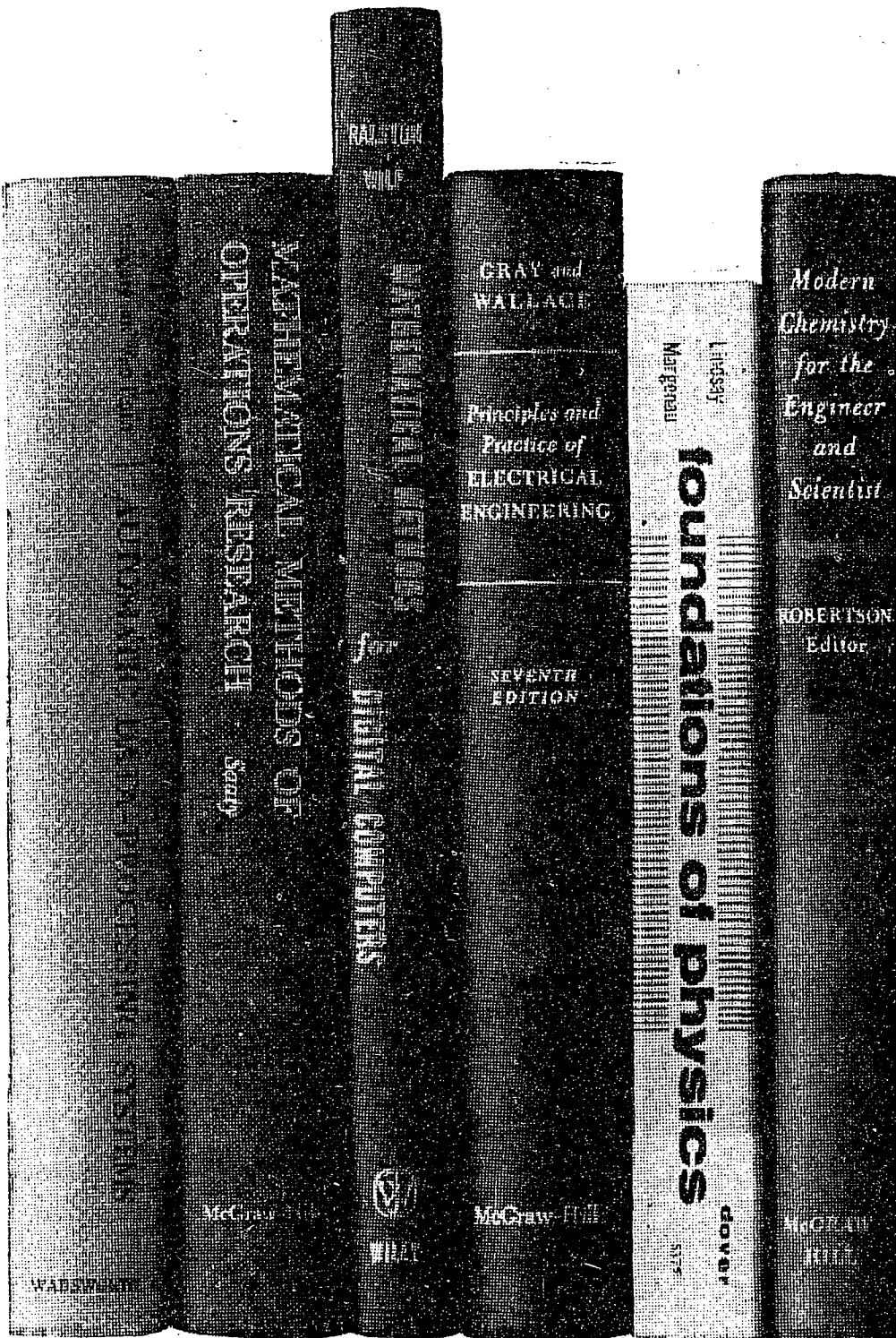
