Dr. Roy Blough, economist and professor of international business at Columbia University, will present the first of the Graduate School Lecture Series at 8 p.m. Tuesday in 121 Sparks.

He will speak on "Nationalism and Organized World Economy."

From 1938 to 1946 Blough was serving with the U.S. Department as director of tax research and as-, sistant to the secretary.

He is the author of "Faving the Tax Problem" and "Federal Tax-ing Process," and from 1947 to 1950 was editor of the National Tax Journal.

A native of Pittsburgh, Blough received his bachelor of arts degree from Manchester College in Indiana and his master of arts degrees and doctor of philosophy degrees from the University of Wisconsin,

He taught at Manchester College for several years in the 1930's

Blough joined the University of Chicago faculty in 1946 as professor of economics and pol-Itical science and has been at Columbia since 1955.

In 1949, he participated in a tor with the department of economic affairs of the United Nations.

The lecture is co-sponsored by the Economics Faculty Seminar and the Graduate School.


