

# LA Revision Plan May Go to Senate

A general revision in the requirements in the College of the Liberal Arts may come before the University Senate for approval at its next meeting, Richard C. Maloney, associate dean of liberal arts, said yesterday.

The new degree programs were approved May 24 at a meeting of the Liberal Arts faculty.

The revision includes the graduation requirements for the bachelor of arts degree and the offering of a new degree in liberal arts, that of a bachelor of science.

The science program was originally sponsored by the mathematics department of liberal arts, which felt that students majoring in mathematics or science should have more courses offered them and should get a degree rather than an arts degree.

Under the new bachelor of arts program, students would be allowed more freedom in choosing courses to meet graduation requirements. They could choose from courses in economics, history, political science, sociology, anthropology, archeology, social science and international understanding to complete their requirements.

A similar change is called for in the other four major areas in

liberal arts — sciences, foreign language, speaking and writing skills and humanities.

At present a student must choose from specified courses in a field, for example, Economics 14 or Political Science 3.

The proposed changes in both programs would lower the minimum number of credits for graduation to 124 for women and 130 for men. At present women must complete a minimum of 126 credits and men a minimum of 132 credits.

The additional 6 credits for men come from required ROTC courses.

According to Maloney, the faculty is now investigating methods of aligning the four term program with the new requirements. Under consideration, he explained, is a means to divide the teaching schedules of the two courses required in English composition into three terms.

# Greeks to Hold Bridge Tourney Tonight in HUB

Thirty fraternities and 24 sororities will compete in the Greek Week Bridge Tournament at 7 tonight in the Hetzel Union ballroom.

The Greeks will play regular duplicate tournament bridge, according to Judith Friedman, contest co-chairman. They will be competing for a trophy and 20 points toward the over-all Greek Week trophy.

Second place in the tournament will carry 15 points and third place, 10 points. An additional ten points will be given each group that enters the contest.

Last night about 825 coeds were entertained by the fraternities for the Greek Week Exchange Dinners. Members of 24 sororities were entertained for dinner followed by faculty talks.

Greek Week will continue with the IFC Sing Finals at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

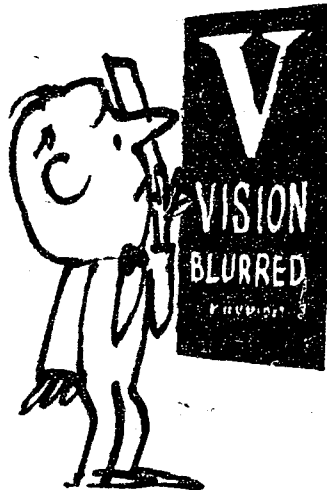
