The University Chapel choir, under the direction of Willa Taylor, will sing for the service.

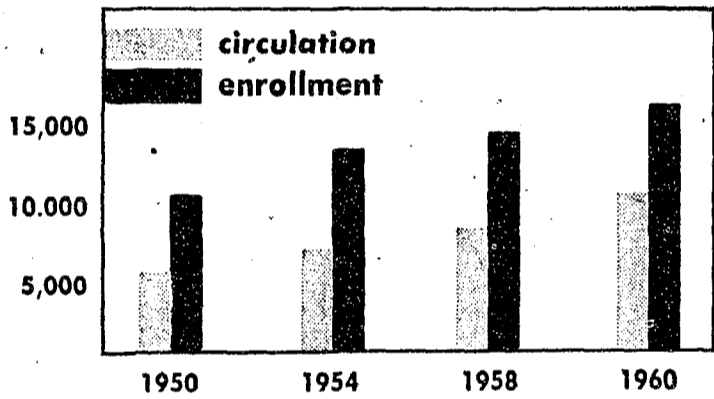
Baker Authors Chapter

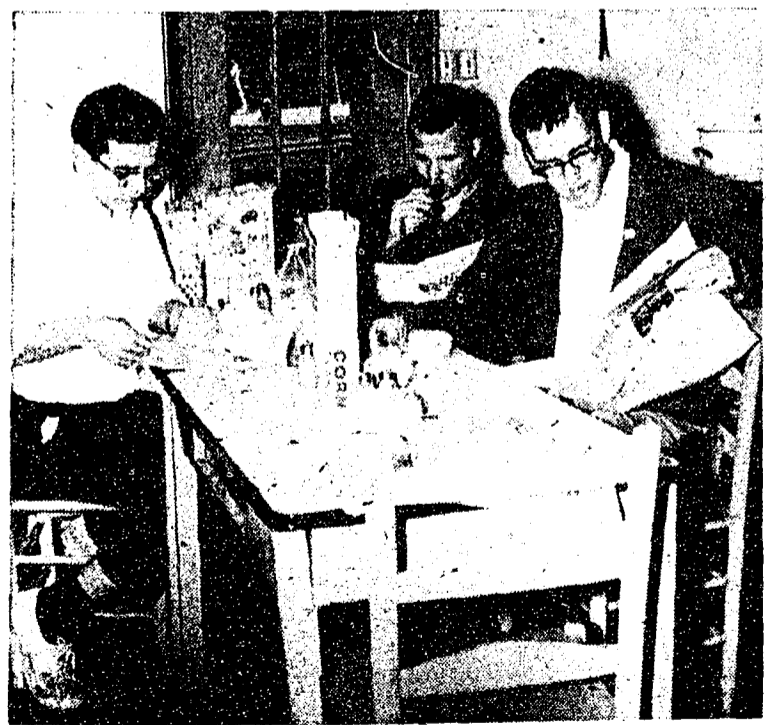

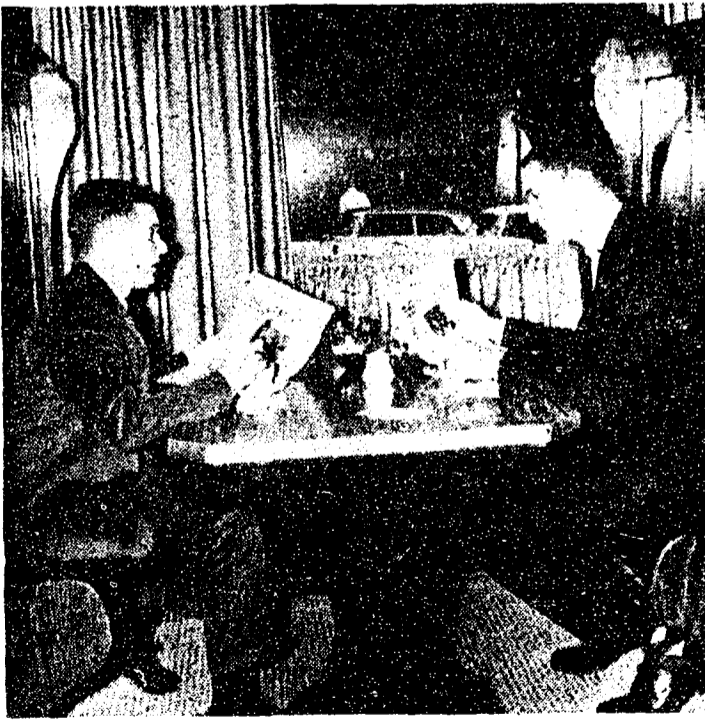
