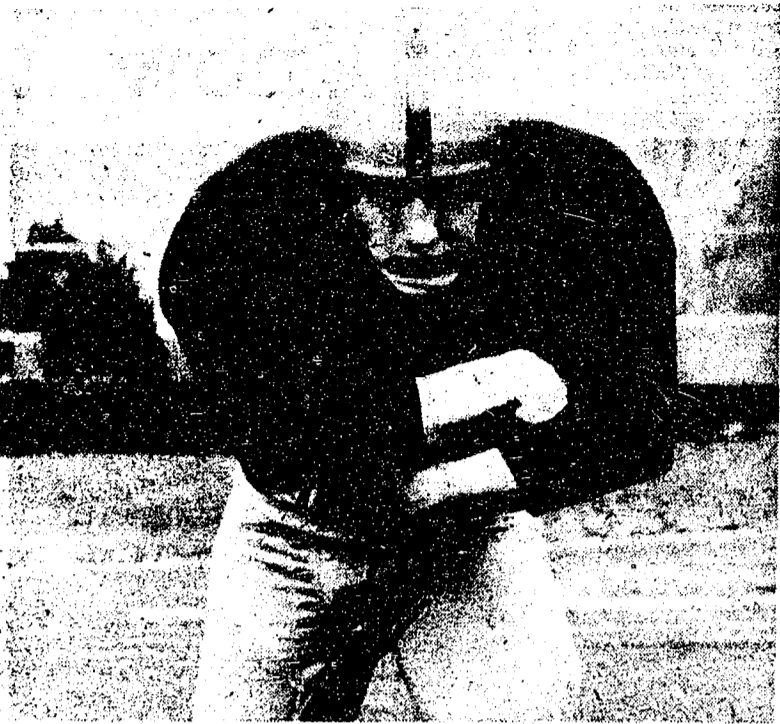


Hall Holds Key To Lion Victory

(Continued from page one) didn't win. We hope to prove it against Illinois."

Penn State will be counting heavily upon quarterback Galen Hall and halfback Don Jonas tomorrow.

These two did their best to pull the Syracuse game out, but Lady Luck wasn't in their corner.

Hall threw one touchdown pass and then directed Penn State's thrilling desperation drive which ended on the Syracuse four with just seven seconds remaining.

Jonas was nothing but trouble to Syracuse too. He went 45 yards on a delayed handoff for Penn State's first score and then kept the Lions in the game with a 46-yard pass to Bob Mitinger during the final drive.

A product of West Scranton High, Jonas joined the Lions a week late this fall and didn't even play against Boston U.

But he has come along fast after spending last year in the Army and is Penn State's second leading ground gainer with 132 yards in 24 carries.

Jimmy Kerr, State's other starting halfback, is the leading ground gainer. He has gained 212 yards in 47 carries with his best day coming against Army when he scored three touchdowns.

Sam Sobczak, who was bothered by a cold during the latter stages of the week, will be the fullback with sophomore Dave Hayes in reserve.

Oppermann and Mitinger will start at end, with Jim Smith and Stew Barber handling the tackle spots. The guards will be Bill Poop and Joe Blasenstein with Jay Huffman at the pivot position.

Illinois will field a team with three prospective All-Americans in the starting lineup.

Big Joe Rutgens, who goes 245,

heads the Illini line which averages 229 pounds compared with 210 for State.

Bill Brown, considered by many as the finest fullback in the Big Ten, and quarterback Johnny Easterbrook are the other two possibilities.

Brown, Illinois' top ground gainer, is a bruising runner and works well with Easterbrook on Illinois' deceptive outside belly series.

Easterbrook is one of the smallest quarterbacks in the nation at 5-8, 156, but he is a good passer and a tricky runner.

The rest of the backfield will be made up of veterans Joe Krakowski and Marshall Starks at the halfback posts.

The Illini use an unbalanced line with a split end most of the time.

Ed O'Bradovich has been running at the split end post most of the year with Ernie McMillan at the other terminal.

Larry Lavery (216) or Cliff Roberts (256) will team with Rutgens at tackle. Tony Parrilli and Joe Wendryhoski are the guards with John Kruze at center.

Last year, the Lions and Illini played in Cleveland with State winning, 20-9, before a slim gathering of 15,000 in cavernous Municipal Stadium.

A crowd of 46,000 is expected for tomorrow's Dad's Day game.

Next week Penn State will play host to West Virginia in Beaver Stadium while Illinois tangles with Purdue in Lafayette, Ind.

Army Hands Lion Frosh 14-7 Defeat

WEST POINT, N.Y., Oct. 21—Army's frosh football team avenged their varsity's 27-16 loss to Penn State two weeks ago by grinding out a 14-7 victory over the Nittany freshmen here today.

It was State's second loss in three games. The Lions lost to Navy, 22-7, last week after opening the season with a 21-20 win over West Virginia.

The outlook was bright for State in the first quarter when they pushed Army back to their own four.

With a fourth down situation the Cadets were forced to punt, but State's Ralph Baker, a 6-3, 195-pound guard from Lewistown crashed in to block the kick. Baker smothered the ball as it bounced into the end zone and after Don Caum booted the extra point, the Lions led, 7-0.

State blocked another Army punt shortly after but couldn't capitalize on the break.

Army roared back in the second quarter with the score coming on a quarterback option play. The Cadets went for two points and at halftime led, 8-6.

The Lions had numerous scoring opportunities in the second half but a fumble, two interceptions, and a pass that Lion Tom Paton dropped on Army's two kept them from hitting paydirt.

The Cadets scored an insurance touchdown in the fourth quarter when Harry McMillan scored on a quarterback keeper.

The Lions will close out the season at Pitt next week.

Williams' 1960 Comeback Earns Him AP Award

NEW YORK (AP) — For rebounding brilliantly from his most disastrous big league season, Ted Williams yesterday was named the American League comeback player of the year for 1960.

The retired Boston Red Sox outfielder received 96 of the 182 votes cast by baseball writers in the annual Associated Press poll. Roy Sievers of the Chicago White Sox was named on 34 ballots and finished second.

Booters Seek 2nd At Maryland Today

If the Nittany soccermen don't improve their powder puff offense and slipshod defense at College Park, Md., today, goalie Dave Grubbs will have to be an octopus on wheels to stem the Terrapin tide.

The Lions, averaging a sickly 1.5 goals per game to date, face a Maryland squad that has won the Atlantic Coast soccer title for seven consecutive years.

If Grubbs, the star in a losing cause against Colgate last week, is in top form against Maryland, State's chances of an upset will be greatly enhanced.

The lanky junior put on a spectacular show in the first half against the Red Raiders. Time after time he crashed through a ring of Colgate attackers to pounce on dangerously loose balls.

But in the third period three freak goals and one legitimate one sent the Lions skidding to their third loss in four games.

Bucknell and West Chester were State's other conquerors with the Lions' only win coming over Syracuse, 3-0.

In an effort to add more punch to the Penn State attack, soccer coach Ken Hosterman has moved Ken Link from his fullback position to center-forward. The Lion mentor is hoping that Link's spirit and drive will light a fire under his front line teammates.

Russ Naylor will switch from center-forward to right wing in place of the injured Glenn Ream. Lou Van Rafelghem, who scored State's lone goal in the Colgate defeat, remains at left wing.

Val Djurdjevic, hampered by a leg injury last week, will team with Howie Farrar at the inside posts.

Hosterman will move sophomore Jay Stormer from right to left halfback to make way for Carlos Astiz. Astiz will take over Stormer's former spot.

Either Gene Ralford or Bill Rierson will get the nod at center-halfback.

Captain Wayne Rodgers will move back into the starting lineup at left-fullback and John Miller will be at right-fullback.

Boilermakers Plan Upset For Iowa

Iowa, Mississippi, Missouri and Minnesota, four teams so far bypassed by Old Man Upset, test their stature in key college football games today as the season hits the halfway mark with a flourish.

The four, members of The Associated Press top ten that also includes three other teams with perfect records, have current tradition against them for at least two of the nation's top teams have fallen in each of the past two Saturdays.

Last week it was Ohio State, Wisconsin and Clemson. The week before Illinois, Purdue and Arkansas went under.

Top-ranked Iowa (4-0), leading the Big Ten with a 3-0 mark, plays its homecoming game against Purdue, the team which belted Ohio State. The tenth-ranked Boilermakers pit their power against Iowa's speed.

Mississippi, ranked second, takes on a speedy Arkansas team that nipped Texas 24-23 last week. Missouri (4-0) plays always dangerous Iowa State and also tries to keep a share of first place in the Big Eight. Colorado, matching the Tigers 2-0 conference mark, plays Nebraska.

Sixth-ranked Minnesota (4-0) could step into the Big Ten lead if Iowa falters. The Gophers, 2-0 in the conference, play the 61st Little Brown jug game against Michigan.

The rest of the unbeaten in the select group should make it. Third-ranked Syracuse (5-0), the nation's top defense team, meets winless West Virginia which has scored only two touchdowns.

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
