# Six Lions Tie for First As Harriers Crush WVa

Six Penn State harriers snapped the tape simultaneously yesterday afternoon to annihilate previously undefeated West Virginia, 15-50, on the University Golf Course.

The Penn State Blue Band, running through its daily drills on the intramural fields, urged the Lion sextet on in the last 100 yards to the tune of "The Nittany Lion."

Gerry Norman, Herm Weber, Steve Moorhead, Howie Deardorff, Ernie Noll, and Dennie Johnson were the men to turn the trick for the Lions, clinging together in a pack throughout the entire meet.

Penn State coach Chick Werner, while disappointed with the winning time of 26:31.4 was pleased with the showing of Deardorff, Johnson and Noll, who turned in performances almost a minute better than last week's against Michigan State.

Mike Miller was the big surprise for the Nittany harriers. Miller, who last week placed 14th in the Michigan State meet, took seventh place yesterday, with a time almost two minutes better than last Saturday's.

Miller stuck with the pack up till the 4.5-mile mark, but faded in the last 800 yards to finish in 26:53.

West Virginia coach Stan Romanouski felt his team did a good job, despite the lopsided score.

"We weren't too disappointed with the meet. Penn State has a mighty good team and I feel we accomplished something by running against competition like this," Romanouski said.

"We ran our best performance of the year, time-wise, today. This was the first time we have run five miles all year. All of our previous meets were run on four-mile courses. Some of the four-mile times for our boys today were almost a minute better than the winning times in our other five meets," the Mountie coach said.

"Right now we're building up our team for the future. All of our first five runners are sophomores or juniors and will be back next year," Romanouski said.

"Penn State has a speed course, with a lot of straightaways, whereas our course is full of steep hills with little or no straightaways. We hope to make a better showing next year when we get Penn State on our hilly course," the Mountie mentor concluded.

Mountaineer Herb Rogers took the lead at the crack of the starting gun and hung on gamely for the first mile, with a pack of Lions clawing at his heels.

But Rogers couldn't stand the pace and at the end of a mile and a half began fading.

By the three-mile mark, the seven Nittany harriers had opened up a 200-yard spread over Rogers and a second Mountie runner, Tom Spelsberg.

By the end of 4½ miles, the Nittany hill and dalers had worked their lead up to 300 yards (Continued on Page Eight)

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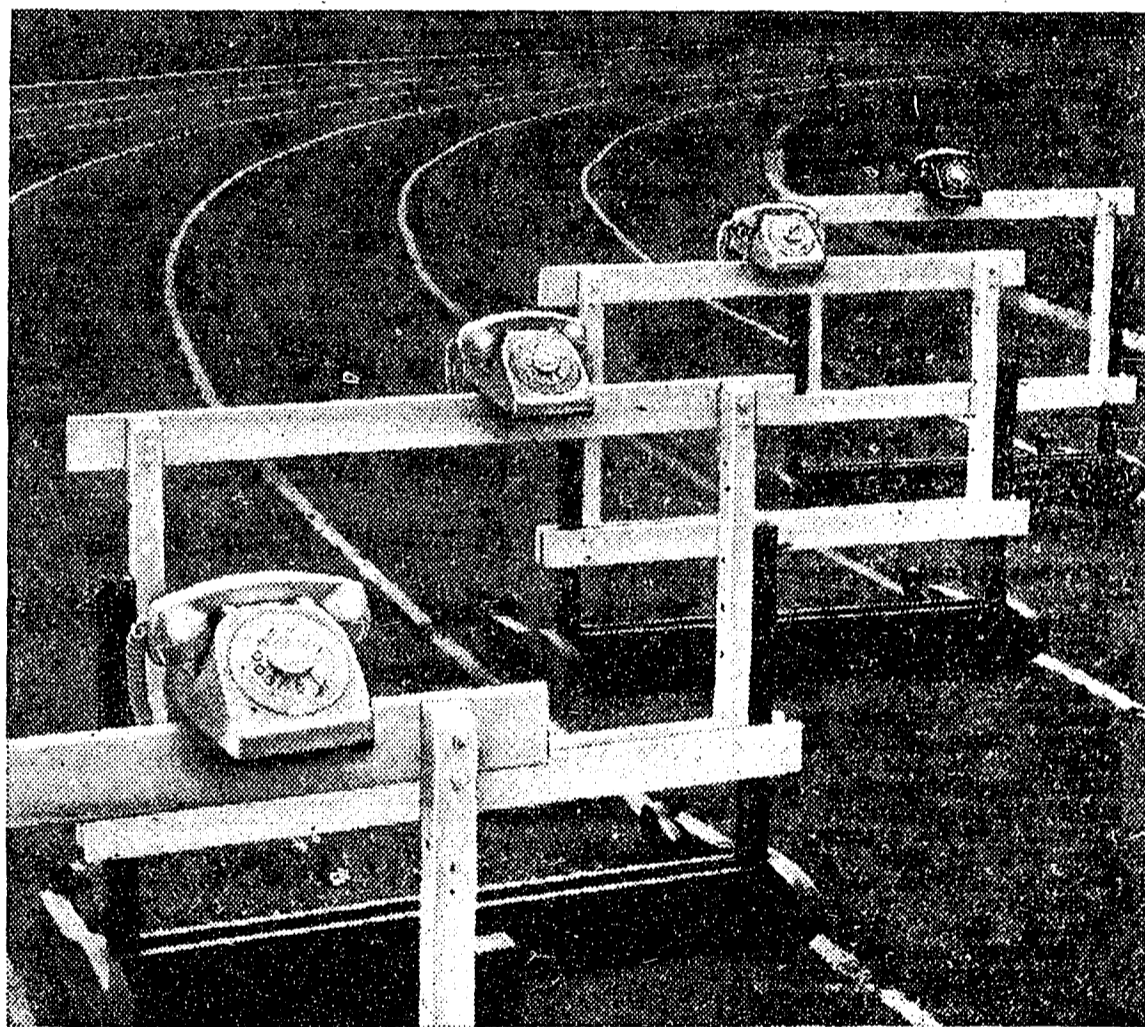
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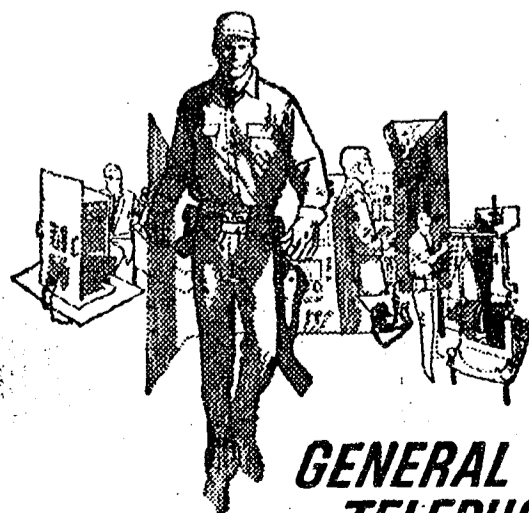
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
