

Mollegan Will Speak At Schwab Service

The Rev. Dr. Albert T. Mollegan, professor of Christian ethics at the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C., will give the sermon for the University Chapel Service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

He will speak on "The Bible and the Existentialists." Mollegan is founder of and lecturer in the Protestant Episcopal Seminary, a theological college for lay persons. The Washington seminary has become a center for relating Christianity to psychoanalysis, modern art and contemporary social problems.

He received his theological degrees from Virginia Seminary and Union Seminary, New York, and his doctor of divinity degree from the University of the South.

The Chapel Choir, under the direction of Willa Taylor, will sing for the service.

Mollegan will also speak at the annual Reformation Sunday service sponsored by the State College Council of Churches and the University Christian Association.

The service will be held at 7 p.m. tomorrow in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.

Four readings from the era of the Great Reformation will be presented at the service.

The Rev. Samuel N. Gibson, executive director of the U.C.A., will speak at the Protestant Worship Service at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

His topic will be "Politics and the Reformation."

Music for the services will be provided by the Meditation Chapel Choir under the direction of James Beach.

A campus Christian worker, Gibson received his bachelor of science degree in architecture from the Georgia Institute of Technology and his bachelor of divinity degree from Yale Divinity School. He also obtained his master of sacred theology degree from Yale.

Rev. Frederick McGuire, Vincentian father active in missionary work in China, will speak on "Foreign Affairs."

The third Interfaith Coffee Hour sponsored by Hillel Foundation will be held at 3:30 p.m. Thursday at Hillel. Hazel B. Ramos, graduate student in sociology from Manila, will speak on "Sociological Elements in the Philippines."

Council Studies Bluebook 'Jam'

The Chemistry-Physics Council decided Wednesday to investigate the possibility of staggering bluebooks within the college to prevent students from having more than one bluebook on the same day.

III. Judging:

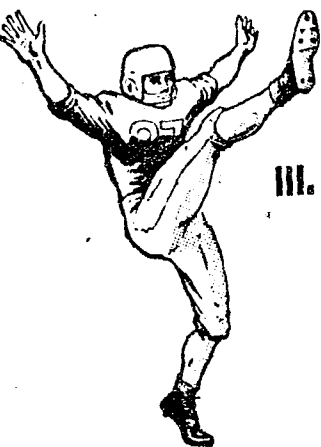
1. The ease with which the judges may interpret or understand the meaning or theme of your banner will mean much in the judging of these banners.
2. The breakdown of the scoring points is as follows:
 - clarity 20 points
 - originality 30 points
 - expression of Penn State spirit 30 points
 - craftsmanship 20 points

II. Banner requirements and contest rules:

1. Banners must be completed by 5:00 p.m., Nov. 4, 1960. They will be judged between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.
2. Banners must be intact until 5:00 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5th, 1960.
3. No display will cost more than twenty-five dollars (\$25)
4. Displays will be disqualified for failure to adhere to contest rules.
5. The Daily Collegian reserves the right to remove any banner that is in any way derogatory, demoralizing, or in poor taste to our University ideals.
6. Any dorm unit is eligible to participate.

IV. Awards:

1. The first place winner shall receive a trophy from the Association of Independent men.
2. The first three winning banners will be announced at the Penn State vs. Maryland football game on Saturday, Nov. 5, 1960.
3. The trophy will be awarded at the Friday Pep Rally, Nov. 4, 1960, the evening prior to the Maryland game.
