

# Campus Leaders Meet To Set OSGA Policies

Student and administrative leaders representing all the University's commonwealth campuses met here last night to establish the Organization of Student Government Associations.

These leaders will be responsible for stating the organization's immediate objectives, and organizational structure and policy. Merle E. Campbell, dean of student affairs for commonwealth campuses, said.

Campbell said the OSGA, will as proposed, maintain inter-campus communications, develop programs for training student government officers, and plan and conduct an annual encampment for the University's student leaders.

The group was welcomed by Student Government Association President Richard Haber, Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, special assistant to the president for student affairs, and Campbell.

The Administrative Committee on Student Affairs, consisting of Martin L. Zeigler, director of resident student affairs; George L. Donovan, coordinator of student affairs, and Merle E. Campbell, committee chairman, set forth four objectives for the group to consider:

- To provide for an exchange of ideas and techniques in the various areas of student extra-curricular endeavor.
  - To provide a means for the dissemination of information on University policy, philosophy and ideals among responsible student leaders.
  - To develop student leadership by discussion and example.
  - To orient student leaders from the various campuses as to means by which the student bodies of these campuses may eventually be better integrated.
- The proposed plans include recommendations for three OSGA meetings per year and a "Congress" for all the student governments of the University.

# 4 Students Placed On Probation

Four students were placed on probation Wednesday night by the Nittany Area Student Tribunal, according to Leroy S. Austin, associate dean of men. All four were participating in a battle involving two fire extinguishers.

One student who had not handled the fire extinguishers but was throwing water around was given a tribunal probation, Austin said yesterday afternoon. He will lose no privileges but this probation will be considered in case he is involved in any further trouble, he added.

Another student who had no previous offenses but had taken active part in the battle was put on probation with the office of the dean of men. This penalty, Austin said, does not result in any loss of privileges.

Two boys with previous offenses were put on disciplinary probation by the tribunal. These cases are pending until Austin talks with the students.

Last week the Senate Subcommittee on Discipline put one student who had taken part in the incident on suspended suspension for the rest of the year.

## Faculty to Launch UCA Fund Drive; Goal Set at \$3500

Over 100 faculty members will help the University Christian Association launch its fund drive for faculty-staff contributions this week.

According to Dr. Charles W. Rutschky, campaign chairman, the goal for the contributions is \$3500. Last year, \$3200 was contributed by faculty members, Rutschky said.

The annual canvassing is designed to acquaint the faculty and staff with the work and purposes of the UCA, Rutschky said that funds, he said.

Since the University does not contribute to the operating budget of the UCA, Rutschky said that the group's funds must come from the faculty contributions, member churches of the UCA and students.

# SGA Thrift Flight to Europe Will Cost Less This Year

Students flying to Europe from New York's Idlewild airport for London on June 11 and will arrive back in New York on July 24.

Students flying to Europe next summer, via the SGA Student Plan, will be able to go for \$25 less than those who went last summer.

Haber said that applications are available at the SGA Office in the Hetzel Union Building and also at the Penn State Travel Agency in State College.

This year, SGA is again offering its Thrift Flight to Europe for students, faculty and staff of the University but the cost per person has gone down from \$285 to \$260.

Another trip to Europe being sponsored by the SGA is the "Economy Tour" which will include passage to Europe as well as travel on the continent.

According to Richard Haber, SGA president, 76 Penn Staters made the trip last summer and many more are expected to go this coming summer.

The flight will also be \$260 under this plan with an extra \$599 for accommodations and meals, thus bringing the total cost to \$859.
