

Divinity Prof To Speak At Chapel

Dr. James L. Adams, professor of Christian ethics at the Harvard Divinity School, will speak at the University chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow. His topic will be "Broken Cisterns and Earthen Vessels."

Author and translator of articles on social ethics, race relations and the church, Adams has also written two books entitled "Taking Time Seriously" and "The Changing Reputation of Human Nature."

He is co-editor of "The Beacon Press Series on the Sociology of Politics and Religion."

Preacher for the Protestant Worship Service at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel will be the Rev. Arthur R. Seyda.

Rev. Seyda, Lutheran chaplain to the University, will speak on "Christ and Caesar."

The speaker joined the University staff last fall after serving pastorates in New York, Connecticut and Pennsylvania.

More HS Students Must Take 'Boards'

Pennsylvania students applying for admissions to the University who are in the second fifth of their high school classes will now be required to take a College Board Entrance Examination, the University Senate ruled Thursday.

In presenting the report of the Committee on Admissions, Richard G. Stoner, chairman, said that only a small percentage of the students admitted this year were below the second fifth of their graduating class.

He explained that in the future the admissions policy will have to be even more selective because of the increasing number of students applying.


The previous admissions policy had required Pennsylvania students below the second fifth to submit their scores of the Standard Aptitude Test of one College Board. Those in the top two fifths were admitted on the basis of their high school records.

In a discussion of the report, Abram Vandermeer asked if the committee had considered requiring the test of the first fifth also.

Stoner answered that the committee had considered this alternate plan, but had found that "students admitted from the first fifth of their high school classes consistently graduate with higher averages."

Hugh M. Davison spoke in opposition to the bill, saying that it opposed the true purpose of a land grant institution. He moved that the rule apply only for one year and then revert to the original proposal. This was defeated and the original motion was passed.


