Senate to Review Library Status

University Senate agreed Thursday to establish a standing committee to continually review the status of the Pattee Library.

John J. Schanz, chairman of the Senate Committee on Educational Policy, said that the committee wanted to be as specific and realistic as possible in its action.

The committee will be composed of members of the Senate and will have as ex-officio members the vice president for academic affairs, the vice president and the University librarian.

The Senate further suggested that President Eric A. Walker consider the establishment of a "parallel" committee on the Board of Trustees, in order to "involve the board directly in maintaining University prestige and excellence."

Schanz further clarified the committee's duties by adding that it "would not be concerned with

specific budget or day to day operation."

He added that his committee felt there should be administrative support on the improvement of the library.

The action of the Senate was a result of a report on the shortcomings of the library made last spring by the Liberal Arts faculty and submitted to President Eric A. Walker.

The report points out that "the lack of specific texts, incomplete

standard editions and wornout reference works seriously hamper and waste the time of both students, and faculty."

The report recommends that large amounts of money be allocated to the library. Only last month \$100,000 was allocated to the library in a non-recurring grant, the largest amount the library has ever been granted, Ralph W. McComb, University librarian said.
