Powell's 3 Goals Give Cadets Holy Cross Coach 3-1 Win Over Nittany Booters Praises Nittanies

An ironclad Army defense and a hard-charging right wing named Bev Powell combined for a 3-1 victory over the Penn State booters on Nittany Field Saturday.

The loss stopped the Lions' budding win streak at two and just about eliminated any possible chance for an at-large berth in the eastern regional NCAA tournament scheduled for Brooklyn College Nov. 25-26. Powell, a stocky little wing

with plenty of speed, was a one man offense against the Lions. He tallied all three goals to give the Cadets their eighth straight win against only one loss, an opening season defeat to Brockport State Teachers.




