

Injuries Fail to Dampen Lion Goaltender's Spirit

When Lion goalie Dave Grubbs gets ready for a soccer game it looks as if he just emerged from a mummy case.

Grubbs has played nearly every game this year with two shoulder separations, but to watch him perform you would never know.

The junior goalie crashes through teammates and opposing players alike to smother loose balls, and he loves to dive through the air to make last second saves of almost certain goals.

Grubbs' record as a goal tender hasn't been exceptional but many of the balls that got past him weren't completely his fault. In 7 games he has allowed 17 goals.

Injuries to key defensive players and costly mistakes by inexperienced replacements have made the Lion goalie look bad on occasion, and in the first few games of the season he was still a little gun shy from an injury suffered in the Temple game last year.

After that game it was learned he had a bruised kidney and two broken ribs.

"In spring practice and at the beginning of this year Dave didn't look like his old self," Lion coach Ken Hosterman said.

"He was holding back, he wasn't aggressive," Hosterman said. "I think unconsciously he was trying to protect his old injury."

But Grubbs slowly regained his confidence and against Syracuse he was so outstanding the crowd gave him a loud ovation when he left the game.

"If Grubbs was on a team like West Chester there wouldn't be anybody that could touch him," second string goalie Jim Gottschling said.

Phils, McCloskey Plan New Stadium

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia Phillies and builder Matthew H. McCloskey plan to build a 45,000-seat stadium at a cost of \$8 million in northwest Philadelphia, it was disclosed yesterday.

Robert Carpenter, owner of the National League ball club, and McCloskey, national finance chairman of the Democratic party, would build the modern stadium on city-owned land.

The proposal is contingent upon the city's making the land available under a long term lease and for a token rental.

Pitt Gives Michelosen New Pact

PITTSBURGH (AP) — John Michelosen, head football coach at the University of Pittsburgh, was given an indefinite contract yesterday.

"His job is just as permanent as mine," said Chancellor Edward Litchfield in making the announcement at a news conference.

Michelosen's present contract expires at the end of this season. In his nearly six years at Pitt he has a 33-23-5 record. The 1960 record is 4-2-3 with one game remaining against Penn State Saturday.

Litchfield said the indefinite contract "is an expression in faith in the job Michelosen has done."

No salary terms were announced.

Litchfield said he is asking Michelosen "to do everything he can to become an influence on the campus."

The chancellor added: "We want to do something more for Michelosen and make him as permanent a member of the staff as anyone. We are trying to eliminate the uncertainty that goes with a contract."

AL to Draw Up Plans For New Franchises

NEW YORK (AP) — The expanded American League will sort out applicants today for the new franchises at Washington and Los Angeles and will finalize plans for stocking the new clubs with talent for the 1961 baseball season.

It is possible that some of the players actually will be allotted to the new clubs at the meeting, where a tentative 162-game schedule is to be approved.

St. Louis Group Buys Kansas City Franchise

CHICAGO (AP) — The Kansas City Athletics, who never have belonged to home folk, yesterday were sold conditionally to a St. Louis syndicate for \$3.5 million.

Probate Judge Robert J. Dunne signed an order for sale of 52 per cent of A's stock owned by the late Arnold Johnson of Chicago with the understanding the St. Louis group also will acquire the other 48 per cent over the weekend.

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
