

Decorators Must Avoid Fire Hazard

All students and student organizations planning to put up Christmas decorations in the residence halls must have all the combustible materials fireproofed, John F. Fishburn, head of operation division of the Department of Housing, said yesterday.

Fireproofing will be done from 1 to 3 p.m. beginning tomorrow at the Landscape Maintenance Depot which is east of the Petroleum Refining Laboratory. Other times for fireproofing are from 1 to 3 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays until Dec. 15.

This service is for on-campus student organizations and individuals only. Trees may be purchased from the maintenance and utility department and will already be fireproofed.

Plans to construct decorations outside the residence halls must be submitted beforehand to the Department of Housing. The department itself will be putting up decorations in the residence areas, Fishburn said. They will be mostly lighted signs saying "Seasons Greetings," "Merry Christmas," etc., he added.

Decorations within the residence halls must be hung from picture moldings or bulletin boards. They may not be attached to the walls, ceilings, or woodwork nor may paste, glue, scotch tape or masking tape be used to attach the decorations, Fishburn said. Water-soluble paint may be used to decorate windows and mirrors.

Under no conditions should paraffin wax be melted in the halls since it is very inflammable, he said. Students should also contact the supervisor of the hall or houseman in situating Christmas trees.

The Department of Housing hopes to have this information placed on all bulletin boards in the residence halls by today. If students do not adhere to this information, and damage to the halls results, it might be necessary to take down the decorations and the individual or organization would be held responsible, Fishburn said.

Students are reminded that all decorations put up on the windows or in the rooms must be removed before they leave for Christmas vacation.

The Penn State Players will present their second production of the season, Tennessee Williams' "Summer and Smoke" at 8 p.m. Friday at Center Stage.

Directed by Ellis Grove, instructor in theater arts, the play concerns a harried love affair between Alma Wienmiller,

a shy daughter of a southern minister, played by Mary Lee Sheftic, and John Buchanan Jr., a worldly medical student, played by Edward Anderson.

While John has been away at school, Alma, burdened by a neurotic mother and an indifferent father, has withdrawn into herself to find life's meaning on "the spiritual plane."

Upon John's return the two are drawn to each other despite the differences in their personalities — and Alma is certain she is in love.

The plot follows the development of their love and the effects of their personalities on each other.

According to Grove, the staging for "Summer and Smoke" has presented some unique problems. The production calls for symbolic lighting effects in setting the mood in certain scenes.

Working with limited facilities at Center Stage, Grove has had to introduce his own variations in lighting and set design to express

the essence of Williams' stage directions.

Other members of the cast include Vincent Landro, Anne Lausch, Susan Brown, Eileen McCann, Basil Augustine, Robert Pikulsky, Roxanna Walton, Sara Bransdorf, Ronald Jackson, Joseph DeVivo, Stuart Fischhoff and Vincent Scassellati.

Dean Merritt A. Williamson, dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, was elected vice-chairman of the Engineering Division of the American Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities at its annual meeting held in Washington, D.C.

Nuclear Eng. Dept. Names 3 to Faculty

Three new faculty members have been appointed to the staff of the Department of Nuclear Engineering.

They are Dr. Ward Diethorn, as assistant professor of nuclear engineering; William Sjoborg, as research associate; and Gordon Robinson, as research assistant.

Diethorn came to the University from Battelle Memorial Institute where he was employed as assistant division chief of the Radioisotopes and Radiation Division and where he spent five years in research on radiation effects on reactor fuels.

He received his bachelor of science degree in chemistry from Lake Forest College, Lake Forest, Ill., and his master of science and doctor of philosophy degrees in chemistry from the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Diethorn will assume teaching and research duties in the field of reactor materials and in the application of radioisotopes to industrial uses.

Sjoborg has been with Curtiss-Wright Corp. as head of the Experimental Physics Section for the past five years. Prior to that, he was with the Aeronautics Division working on the application of radioisotopes to aircraft engine research.

Sjoborg received his bachelor of science and master of science degrees in physics from the University of Maryland. He did additional graduate work in physics at Penn State.

Robinson came to the University from the Babcock and Wilcox Co., Nuclear Division, Lynchburg, Va., where he participated in the start-up of nuclear reactors and the instruction of new reactor operators.

He received his bachelor of science degree in fuel technology at Penn State in 1952 and did graduate work in nuclear engineering.

WRA to Add Regulation To Handbook

Last night the Women's Recreation Association Council decided to add a rule which clarifies the official's right to disqualify a team from play for unsportsmanlike conduct to their handbook, "General Rules of WRA Intramurals."

The addition states, "The decision of the referee (umpire or other official for a contest) will be final. This official shall have the power to disqualify a team or an individual member of a team for unsportsmanlike conduct."

WRA Council recommended, however, that before an official takes such action, she consult the faculty member present at the game for her opinion.

In other business, WRA passed a motion to allow the clubs under its jurisdiction to adopt symbols to be made into charms or another type of jewelry. These will be bought at the expense of the individual club members.
