

# Road-Wearry Cagers Take Short Break

Penn State's road-wearry basketball team will get a six-day rest before traveling to Syracuse Tuesday to face the Orangemen in the Onandoga War Memorial.

The Lions, 2-3 after their first five games, had a rough weekend in Charlotte, N.C., losing to Duke 69-46 and Wake Forest 64-78.

Lion coach John Egli plans to spend his time this week looking for some added bench strength.

Egli used only six men in Friday's loss to Duke, and Saturday against Wake Forest he used only five.

The veteran coach is expecting help from a pair of football players — Bill Saul and Dave Robinson — right after the Liberty Bowl game Saturday.

Saul broke into the starting lineup on occasion last year and is a strong boardman. He averaged six points a game.

Robinson impressed as a scorer and rebounder for the freshmen a year ago.

Egli probably won't have Saul and Robinson for the Evansville Tournament at Evansville, Ind., Dec. 27-28 but they should be ready for the Colgate game at Rec Hall, Jan. 5.

In the first round at Evansville, the Lions will face the Purple

Aces while Denver takes on Los Angeles State.

Until Saul and Robinson are ready, Egli will have to count on John Phillips and Don Wilson to give some of the starters a rest.

Neither boy has played much this year, but both are capable of filling in when needed.

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# Ohio State Leads AP Basketball Poll

 Jerry Lucas and Co. from Ohio State hold a commanding lead in the first weekly basketball poll by The Associated Press' panel of sports writers and sportscasters.

Ohio State drew 35 of the 36 first place ballots in the season's first poll. The other first went to Detroit, No. 3, which was knocked out of the ranks of the unbeaten Monday night by Purdue 83-64.

All voting was based on the result of games played through Saturday, Dec. 10.

Unbeaten Bradley, the No. 2 team, finished last week with a

3-0 record and added its fourth of the year by drubbing Northern Michigan 105-77 Monday. Bradley plays Nevada tonight and Wisconsin Saturday. Detroit's only other game this week is Saturday with Nebraska.
