

Robert Shaw Chorale To Give Concert Sunday

The Robert Shaw Chorale, at present making its 13th sold-out tour of the United States, will perform at 8 p.m. in Recreation Hall sponsored by the Artist Series.

Student ticket distribution will continue today and non-student ticket sales will begin at 9 a.m. today.

In 1948 Robert Shaw created the Chorale which has received world-wide acclaim stemming from its numerous tours and the more than 100 recordings for RCA Victor.

Shaw selects his Chorale members with the belief that only the finest singers should be used in group and ensemble work.

Shaw himself presides over all auditions and when on tour, never misses the chance to hear local talent, to advise, reassure or criticize. In this way he has recruited singers from every state of the Union.

Persons chosen to be in the Robert Shaw Chorale must be well trained singers, capable of sight reading almost any piece of music placed before them as well as a musician of unusual accomplishment.

The unusual skill of the singers was shown during the Chorale's recent tour to the Middle East and Europe when they gave 60 concerts in 70 days in 20 countries. Each of the 49 men and women participating in the performance acted as soloist during some part of the tour.

Shaw has been described by members of the Chorale as having moods during rehearsals from "the cool perfection of an experienced conductor to the uninhibited verve of a college cheer leader."

He deviates from the normal practice in his group as he does not place his singers in groups according to their voice classification during performances. Rather he scatters all four voices thus relying on each individual to maintain accurate pitch.

The result of this device is a unique blend of the musical lines — one reason for the excellent tone quality of the Robert Shaw Chorale.

Dusinberre Rites Held In Chapel

Funeral services for George M. Dusinberre, professor of mechanical engineering, were held Monday at the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

Dusinberre, who died on Dec. 30 in his State College home, is survived by his widow, Charlotte, a son William of New York, N.Y., and a daughter, Nancy, of Boston, Mass.

Dusinberre was a native of Pittsburgh and a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy. He did graduate work at Columbia.

Before coming to the University in 1948, Dusinberre served on the faculty of the University of Delaware and of Virginia Polytechnic Institute. He is a retired naval officer.

An expert on heat transfer, Dusinberre has written several books on the subject and was a fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. In 1952 he was appointed to the Society Executive Committee in the heat transfer division.

Dusinberre also held membership in the American Society for Engineering Education, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, Pi Tau Sigma, mechanical engineering honor society and the Society of the Sigma Xi, a graduate scientific society.

Course Lengthened In HomeEc Houses

HomeEc majors can look forward to ten full weeks of cooking, cleaning and two a.m. feedings in the home management houses under programs planned by the College of Home Economics for the four-term year.

Juniors and seniors will be able to go into the houses for any one of their last six terms, according to Dr. Dorothy Houghton, associate dean of the college. Summer terms may be taken in the home

management houses to fill this requirement, she said.

Adjusting home management and course programming to the new system presented no serious problems since most four and five credit courses were changed to three-credit courses last fall, Dr. Houghton explained.

The biggest problem facing the college will probably be in the summer term. Summer sessions have always had a low enrollment within the college — last summer there were only eleven undergraduates enrolled for the main session.

Results of a survey recently compiled by Dr. Houghton show that 27 HomeEc majors are now planning to attend the term beginning in June. (Continued on page eight)

Tomorrow to See Winter's Icy Grip Loosening in Pa.

Old man Winter's icy hand continues to hold Pennsylvania in its grip, but there is some indication of a warming trend breaking the back of the record-breaking cold wave beginning tomorrow.

Milder air, which is pushing northward across the central sections of the nation, raised temperatures into the middle 50's yesterday afternoon.

At the same time mercury readings across the Keystone state ranged between 15 and 28 degrees.

Some of this milder air will move into the local area tomorrow causing the temperature to climb above the freezing mark.

The forecast for today is for sunny skies and cold weather. The high reading will be about 28 degrees.

Partly cloudy and cold weather is indicated for tonight and a minimum of 17 is expected.

Tomorrow should be partly cloudy and somewhat milder. The high reading will be about 38 degrees.

Senate May Reword Rules

The University Senate will meet today to consider wording changes in the Senate Regulations for Undergraduate Students. The changes will make the rules conform to the new four-term system.

One of the changes may affect the wording of the "S" rules which deal with compulsory ROTC. The rules may be reworded to make them applicable to the system which will go into effect in June.

Rules Committee may report on a clarification in the honors program. At the last Senate meeting confusion arose during a discussion on the term standing which would be required for enrollment in this program and no decision was made.

PiKA Fined In Grade Violation

The \$25 fine payable by January 31 was imposed in lieu of a heavier penalty since the violation was unintentional and no records were falsified, Robinson said.
