"For the first couple years of his employment in many indus-tries the college graduate is an investment," Leetch said. "Companies often spend \$15,-

000 in the training of a graduate, hoping that in a few years he will be able to rise to a position of importance and responsibility."

Leetch's advice to a student who is looking for a job is to prepare himself before the interview.

"A student should analyze himself and the courses he has taken so he can determine in what field his interest and ability lies,' Leetch said.

"He should also familiarize himself with the company to which he is applying.

"During an interview, the student tells the company representative about himself, the representative tells the student about the company, and they decide together if this company has the right opportunities for him," he
