

Handmade Articles Featured in Display

A black tiger carved out of buffalo horn, standing only three inches high and in perfect proportion to a real tiger, is one of the handmade articles from India that are now on display in Pattee Library.

The display, presented by the Friends of India Association, also includes a carving of a swan made of buffalo horn; a gold embossed, woman's leather handbag; a pink silk scarf embroidered with gold thread and lacquer and glass bracelets.

The display is on loan from the New York Government of India Trade Center which helps to promote India's "home industry" — the industry of hand made goods.

In India this industry, which includes the making of saris, shirts, ties, pots, pans, curtains and jewelry, is very well developed, said Surendrakumar Patel, research assistant in mechanical engineering from India, who set up the display.

The native Indians usually wear the goods because of a nationalist feeling which has its roots in the years when India was fighting for her independence. At that time, English goods were boycotted as a way of showing opposition to the mother country, Patel said.

To fill the void left by this boycott, India's home industry was started and the wearing of hand-made goods became a way for Indians to show their patriotism.

"Home industry," thus, means that the goods are made in the country and by hand, though not always in a private home. Many of the goods are made in cooperatively owned buildings.

Wall Fresco Honors Lincoln

The Morrill Land Grant College Act, providing for institutions of higher learning like Penn State, was signed by Abraham Lincoln in July, 1862. In honor of this measure the class of 1932 voted its gift money toward the painting of a fresco to depict the significance of the act.

The mural, which we see in Old Main today, was painted in two parts — the stairwell in 1940, and the side walls from 1947 to 1949.

As early as 1930 Harold E. Dickson, then an assistant professor of fine arts, tried to get the administration interested in a land-grant painting to decorate Old Main. Several years later, he and two other members of the department went to Washington to study the work that was being done in the gov-

ernment buildings there.

They were especially impressed by the work done by Henry Varnum Poor in the Justice building and approached him with the fresco idea and an offer of \$4500. Poor then spent time travelling in the state, studying the life of the people and the landscape. The following year, the University Board of Trustees approved his designs and work started immediately.

In a letter to the board, Poor expressed his aim for the mural as, "I want to express the relation of the College to the agricultural and industrial life of the state . . . I want Lincoln to

be a symbol of hope and faith and more than just a part of the design because of his historic signing of the Morrill Act."

The mural was painted in the most permanent of all forms — fresco — which means that paint was applied to wet plaster.

Work was interrupted during World War II with only the main stairwell of the lobby completed, and no visible means of obtaining more funds.

However, in 1946 the sophomore, junior and senior classes all voted their gift money, \$11,000 total, toward the completion of the project. Poor finished the two sidewall murals in June, 1949.

Record Business Handled by UBA

The Used Book Agency has done more business this semester than any time in its history, according to Lawrence Abrams, president of the board of control.

Sales end at 11 a.m. today when the agency closes for the semester. Refunds for incorrect books will be made Monday and Tuesday, according to Abrams, and money for sold books plus all unsold books will be returned Feb. 20 to March 2.

Approximately 19,000 books have been sold through the UBA, Abrams said. He estimated that sales totaled \$50,000 and said that the UBA quota of 20,000 books had been reached.

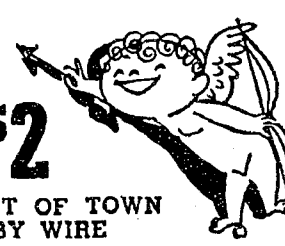
