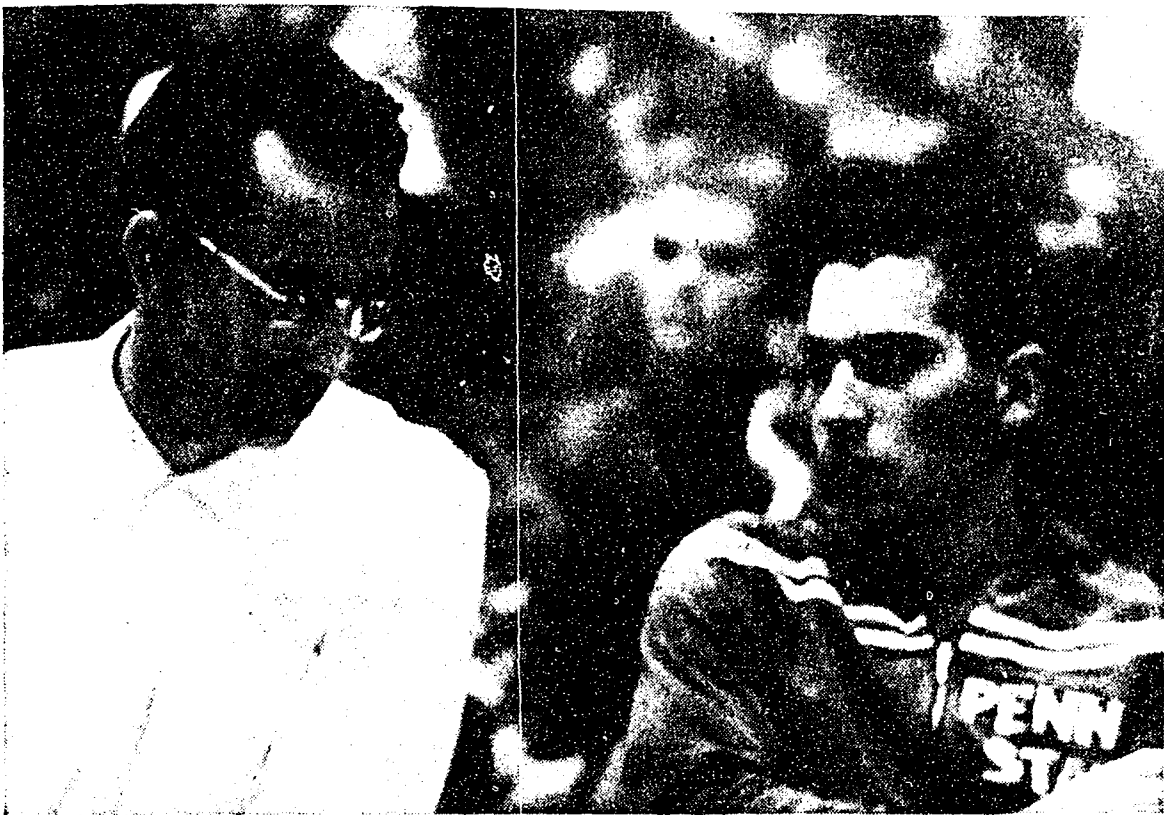


Gymnasts Rout Pitt, 59½-36½

Weiss, Seward Pace Nittanies In Final Home Meet of Season

The Penn State gym team made its home finale a roaring success by downing Pitt, 59½-36½, before 5000 fans in Rec Hall Saturday night.

Coach Gene Weltstone's Lions won every event except the tumbling in boosting their record to 4-1. Pitt is now 0-4.

The Nittanies, led by Greg Weiss and Tommy Seward, put on their most impressive scoring show of the campaign.

Weiss won the side horse and parallel bars and finished second to Seward on the horizontal bar. Seward was second on the side horse.

Pitt started fast by sweeping the tumbling with Earl McConnell, Joe Battaglia and Bob Pingatore.

McConnell racked up a 284 to win his specialty. Battaglia (219) and Pingatore (211) beat State's Dick Criley (193) to put the Panthers in the lead, 13-3.

But then Weiss and Seward took over and the best the Panthers could do for the rest of the meet was a second on the parallel bars.

Weiss started the rout with a flawless performance on the side horse which earned him a first place 288, the highest score of the night.

Seward finished second ahead of Pitt's Ron Daugherty as the Lions narrowed the Panther lead to 17-15.

State grabbed a 27-21 lead after competition on the horizontal bar. Seward scored a 270 to edge Weiss (263) for first and Keith Hagenbuch (245) finished fourth behind Panther Ed Zaminick's 253.

Captain Bob Mumau won the rope climb in 3.7 seconds. Sophomore Bud Williams tied Pitt's Ron Daugherty on his last climb for second place. Both men were timed in four seconds flat.

Weiss scored his second win of

the night on the parallel bars, scoring 284 to Zaminick's 255.

Junior Kenny Morrow came through with his best score of the year (251) to take third place for State.

The Lions put on quite a show in sweeping the flying rings.

Gerry Schaefer (278), Jack Donahue (261) and Larry Yohn (256), one of the top ring teams in the East, boosted State to its final 59½-36½ margin.

Runaway victories highlighted the action in IM swimming at Glennland Pool last night.

Beta Theta Pi defeated Phi Kappa Tau 34-3; Sigma Pi romped over Delta Tau Delta 35-6; and Chester House defeated Beaver House 32-9.

Beta swept the top places in every event, including Greg Weiss' first in diving. The Lion gym star scored 23.6 in his three dives with a 10.6 on a beautiful one-and-a-half from a piked position.

Sigma Pi also took first place victories in all five events. Louis Benzak was the standout performer for the winners. He won the 60-yard freestyle in 36.2, and swam the second leg in the 120-yard relay. Sigma Pi took the relay in 1:05.3.

Jim Abbey of Delt placed sec-

ond in the 60-yard breaststroke to ruin Sigma Pi's chances for a one-two finish in each event.

Chester House had little trouble with Beaver. Sam Weir equalled the best time of the year in the 60-yard freestyle with a 33. He also had an excellent time of 39.1 in the breaststroke.

Jim Jenks won the backstroke with a lightning 39.1. Jenks also swam anchor on Chester's relay team which won with a 1:01.2.
