Perrotta Earns Fellowship

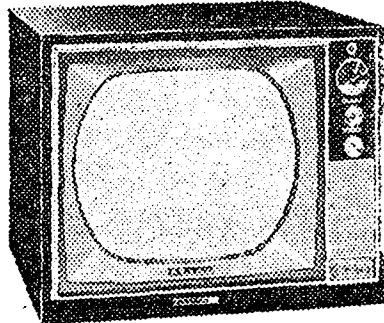

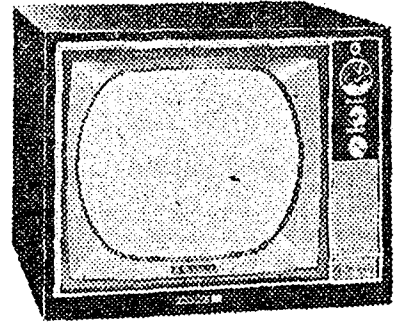

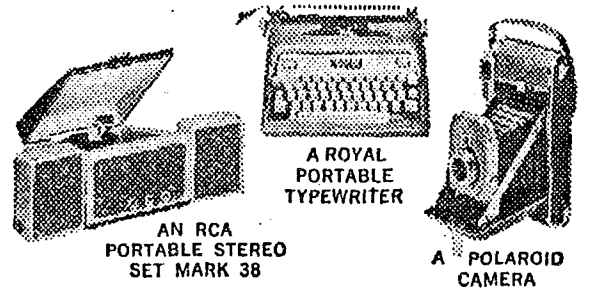
