

President of Juniata Will Give Sermon

Dr. Calvert N. Ellis, president of Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania, will speak on "Noblesse Oblige" for the Protestant worship service at 10:45 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

Ellis is a member of the Committee on Legislation of the Brethren. During World War II, he was a member of the Advisory Committee on Education to Congress.

The University Chapel Choir, directed by Willa Taylor, will sing "Truly My Soul in Silence Waits" by Herbert Beattie and "Ave Verum Corpus" by William Byrd.

Dr. Paul Peachy, Research Fellow of the Institute of Mennonite Studies, will be the speaker for the Protestant worship service at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Eisenhower Chapel.

Peachy was engaged in post-war relief and rehabilitation work in Belgium and Germany under

the Mennonite Central Committee between 1946 and 1951. For the last three years he has been special commissioner for the Mennonite Committee to Japan and East Asia with headquarters in Tokyo.

Peachy has taught sociology, church history and sociology of religion at Eastern Mennonite College in Harrisburg, Va. He recently translated a book on Zen Buddhism which will be published this year.

Reverend Sam N. Gibson, executive director of the University Christian Association, will be the leader of the Protestant worship.

Women's Chorus, Glee Club To Give Combined Concert

combined choruses will sing "May Night," Brahms; "Deo Gracias," Britten; "Mighty Fortress is Our God," Luther.

Soloists include Elizabeth Kullig, senior in music education from West Hazleton; Carol Rights, sophomore in applied arts from Abington; Eliot Block, graduate in music education from Altoona; and Robert Manning, graduate in speech from Schenectady, N.Y.

The rushing program will consist of two informal teas in the Hetzel Union ballroom from 8 to 9:30 Thursday and March 16.


