

DuMars, Cagers In Finale Tonight

From a basketball standpoint Mark DuMars wasted three years at Penn State. Nevertheless, the Lion captain will probably have a lump in his throat when he trots into Rec Hall for the last time tonight at 8:45 against Rutgers.

DuMars, only 5-10, bows out as the second highest scorer in Penn State history with 1128 points for three seasons.

"You can't tell in words how good Mark really is," Lion coach John Egli said last night as he watched the "Magician" go through his last practice session.

"Phenomenal, great, smart — they all fit. We sure are going to miss him. He's one of the best I've ever seen."

Despite his sensational play during the last three years, DuMars never made an All-American team although he received honorable mention honors each season.

"I guess you have to be with a consistent winner to get any recognition," Egli said, ".500 ball isn't good enough."

DuMars isn't the only senior making his final appearance tonight. Don Wilson, who was unlucky enough to understudy DuMars, is the other.

On the Rutgers side, Doug Patton will call it a career. Patton has been to Rutgers what DuMars is to State.

He has been averaging 18 points a game this year and ranks third in all-time Rutgers scoring with 1140 points.

Due to Patton's scoring antics, the Scarlet Knights (11-9) have been enjoying their first winning season in 12 years.

State, on the other hand, lost all hopes for a winning campaign in Pittsburgh Wednesday when Carnegie Tech pulled a 70-57 upset. That dropped the Lion record to 10-13.

In addition to DuMars, the Lions will have high scoring Gene Harris in the starting lineup tonight along with Earl Hoffman, Jake Trueblood and John Mitchell.

Indians Upset Mounties, 88-76

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Eighth-ranked West Virginia's Southern Conference basketball empire toppled after six long years here last night as William and Mary's Indians rode a magnificent 38-point performance by Jeff Cohen to an 88-76 victory in the semi-finals of the conference's championship tournament.

The setback cut short the Mountaineers' bid for a seventh consecutive conference title and halted their winning streak at 13 games. They had taken the conference championship every year since 1956.
