

Editors to Present Journ Career Night

Newspaper Career Night, a program designed to acquaint journalism students with the newspaper editors and publishers and the work they do, will be held at 8 p.m. tonight at La Galleria.

Members of the Pennsylvania Newspapers Publishers' Association will meet approximately 107 students from the School of Journalism to answer their questions and discuss all phases of newspaper work.

The program has been arranged by William K. Ulerich, publisher of The Clearfield Progress and chairman of the Advisory Committee to the School of Journalism.

Ulerich said the purpose of Career Night is "to generate interest in the newspaper industry as a career and to focus attention on the many opportunities in this field."


