Dennis, interviewed by University students over station WFBG-TV in Altoona, said that he hopes everybody realizes the ideological foundation of the new plan. "This is not meant to be a political football," he said.

Lecture Series Will Feature Dickson Tonight

Dr. Harold E. Dickson, professor of art, will speak on "The Arts and the Formation of the United States" at 7:30 tonight in the Hetzel Union assembly room.

The speech is sponsored by the lecture series of the Liberal Arts Student Council.

"This talk will be a flagwaving, chauvinistic art talk, such as would meet the approval of the D.A.R., the American Legion, and the Senate Committee on un-American Activities," Dickson said.

"It will be illustrated by slides in full color, mainly red, white and blue," he explained.

Dickson is a 1922 graduate of the University. He received his masters degree and doctor of philosophy degree at Harvard University.

In 1923 he began teaching at the University and has since been active in faculty and alumni affairs.

Dickson was influential in bringing the land grant murals to Old Main. In 1960 he was recipient of the Superior Teaching Award, given by the University.

ISA Plans To Redefine Purposes
