

Purposes Defined Of Alum Association

(This is the second article in a series on the activities of the Alumni Association as they concern students.)

Very few students know much about the activities of the Alumni Association, but from the day they graduate these activities will affect them tremendously, according to Ross B. Lehman.

Lehman, the executive secretary of the Alumni Association, said the general purposes of the Alumni Association are to organize graduates and former students of the University, represent them on campus, keep them well-informed and stimulate their interest in the University.

"The District Alumni Clubs, which operate under the Alumni Association, act as a buffer for alumni who settle in new communities," Lehman said.

There are now 70 alumni clubs, 42 in Pennsylvania and 28 in 17 states, Lehman said.

"Alumni are potentially the University's most valuable public relations asset and can be a means of informing non-alumni of the University's importance as an in-

stitution of higher learning," he said.

In the Alumni office, Lehman said are the master files which contain cards on the approximately 80,000 persons who have either received a degree from or attended the University. In the past 10 years, the alumni body has increased by 75 per cent, he added.

There are now some 64,000 alumni on the mailing list, he said, more than half of which live in Pennsylvania. Others live in the 47 other continental United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, Australia, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Mexico and the Samoan Islands, he said.
