Although Spring does not seem to have any intention of coming on time this year, the thoughts that usually accompany this long-awaited season are already popping into the heads of the students regardless of the weather.

This means of course that books will go out the window in order to make time for various other activities.

The Sophomore Class Advisory Board is counting on just this.

Only it is hoping that instead of being thrown out the window the books will be put into the book drive boxes which have been placed in residence areas and dining halls, thus officially opening Sophomore Project Week.

The project calls for the collecting of books to be sent to the Asian Foundation. The drive started Monday and will continue until Saturday. Elizabeth Pan, co-chairman of the drive, said the project has five purposes which are:

- To supply tools for learning and increase communication between teachers and students.
- To enlarge Asian students' and scholars' understanding of our

western community of thought.

•To aid English language literacy and stimulate inter-Asian communication through the learning of English as a second language.

•To give how-to-do-it information for educational and civic work.

•To correct misinformation about the West.

The members of the board are hoping that every student will contribute at least one book to the collection. Books which are in good condition and which were published after 1945, are the most desirable, Miss Pan said.

Since the project is being sponsored by the Sophomore Class Advisory Board, all sophomores were urged to participate in the work of collecting, gathering and packing books, by Miss Pan and Robert Miller, co-chairmen.

# Improvement Wins MacLean Sparks Medal

Robert MacLean, junior in secondary education from Haver-town, was recently awarded the Sparks Medal.

The award is given each year to the student who made the greatest academic improvement over the previous semester.

MacLean was one of 93 students who completed last fall semester with a perfect 4 average. His average the previous semester was 1.41.

"I'm not quite sure what happened," MacLean said, "except that when I received the 1.41, I knew it was time to concentrate more on my studies."

MacLean is a graduate of Haverford senior high school, and attended the Ogontz Campus of the University.

The award honors Dr. E. E. Sparks, eighth president of the University, and has been presented for the last 20 years.

The conference will open with the dedication of Home Ec South. The ribbon cutting ceremony will be at 9:00 a.m.

Those taking part in the ceremony will be Dr. Howard A. Cutler, assistant to the President for academic affairs; Dr. Grace M. Henderson, dean of the College of Home Economics; Mrs. Margaret Bastuscheck, president of the College of Home Economics Alumni Association; and Elizabeth Engleman, outgoing president of the college student council.

Besides the colloquium, Saturday's program will feature a speech, "The Span of a Woman's Life and Learning," by Mrs. Opal D. David, director of the Commission on the Education of Women, American Council on Education, Washington, D.C., at 1:15 p.m. in 209 Home Ec South.

Tours of the Home Ec buildings, movies and exhibits will continue throughout the two days. Information will be available in the lobby of Home Ec.


