

# Williams Protests 'Inefficiency' By Resigning Committee Post

Gomer Williams, chairman of the lobbying subcommittee of the SGA Back the Budget Committee resigned his post yesterday in a protest move against what he termed "a committee that does nothing."

Williams said that the efforts of the committee are not being coordinated and the chairmen of the subcommittees don't know what they're doing.

In citing his reasons for resigning, Williams said that he had been under pressure from both within and outside the committee.

He declined to comment on the source of the pressure.

Williams said that he felt the members of the committee and the subcommittees had more interest in a student activity than in working for the \$23.1 million appropriation President Eric A. Walker requested from the state.

In order for the committee to

produce results on the budget appropriation, Williams said, it must move quickly because only firm action by Gov. David L. Lawrence can help the University get the \$23.1 million from the state.

Williams said that while he had been working on the committee there had been only one meeting of the group, attended by only one-half of the members.

He said that without meetings he was unable to pass on to the members of the committee the information he said he received from sources close to the legislature in Harrisburg.

(Continued from page three) sion has allotted \$1,700 each year, Robert Umstead, former elections commission chairman, said.

One thousand dollars of the \$1,700 which the commission receives is to be used for the ordinary operations of the campaign such as printing of ballots and publicizing the polling places and election dates. The remaining \$700 is set aside for radio and newspaper advertising for the candidates and for posters which include each candidate's qualifications, the platforms on which he is running and his picture.

According to Donald M. Saubel, Associated Student Activities treasurer, the elections commission has almost \$1200 of its funds left for the spring campaign. He said that the commission had spent only \$500.39 this year.
