

# Assembly to Meet After Three Weeks

SGA assembly will reconvene at 7:30 Thursday night, Joan Cavanagh, chairman of Rules Committee said last night.

This will end a three-week period in which SGA assumed the form of a committee of the whole and then an executive committee in an attempt to reorganize.

## Parking Halted Near Creamery

Parking on the north side of Curtin Road in the block next to the Creamery Salesroom will be prohibited beginning May 1, Albert E. Diem, vice president for business administration, said yesterday.

Spaces will be available in the Forestry Parking Lot, No. 36, for visitors.

"Plans for prohibiting parking in this area have been in the air for about a year," Diem said.

"It is dangerous for pedestrians and motorists when people parking along the curb open and close their car doors," he added.

"The question of developing a new parking lot near the Creamery to accommodate visitors' cars has been brought up recently," Diem said.

However, a new parking lot requires money and I don't know where the money can be found," he added. "I'd say we're a long way off from a new lot in that area," Diem said.

## Honor Society Elections

New officers of Scabbard and Blade, tri-service military honor society, were elected at last week's regular meeting.

Those elected are Eugene Starr, captain, junior in engineering; James Scott, first lieutenant, junior in metallurgy; Frank Mascia, second lieutenant, junior in psychology; and William Hicks, first sergeant, junior in engineering.

The Assembly will hear a report by Phil Steinhauer, chairman of the SGA Bookstore Committee, on results of the recent student survey investigating the need for a University bookstore.

Ron Sheetz, chairman of the "Back the Penn State Budget Committee" will also report on progress of the committee.

No report on reorganization will be given at this meeting, Richard Haber, SGA president, said last night.

"If sufficient material is gathered from the Executive Committee meeting Wednesday night," Haber said, "we may give a progress report."

Robert Dufner, chairman of the Elections Commission, said last night that he will not appear before Assembly on Thursday.

He added that he may come before the Executive Reorganization Committee on Wednesday, however.

"My final plans for elections will be stated on Sunday when I give instructions to the Elections Commission," Dufner said.

Dufner will meet today with Monroe Newman, chairman of Senate Committee on Student Affairs but he refused to comment on the reason for the meeting.

The Executive Reorganization committee, now in the process of reviewing the constitutional revisions proposed by Duane Alexander, chairman of the original reorganization committee, will meet Wednesday night to discuss the results of hearings held by committee members to obtain stu-
