

Booker Leads Sprinters In IM Qualifying Heats

For a man who thinks he is out of shape Omega Psi Phi's Bill Booker sure can move those legs.

Last night at Beaver Field, Booker won the 440 and placed second in the 100-yard dash in the fraternity IM qualifying heats.

"I'm definitely not in very good shape this year," said the defending 440-yard champ before the start of last night's action.

Minutes later Booker casually won the eighth heat of the 100 in 10.5 seconds and one-half hour later he breezed around the 440-yard track in 52.8 seconds.

His time in the 100 was second

only to Roger Kochman's 10.4. Booker's toughest competitor in the 440-yard final tomorrow should be Alpha Zeta's Dick Kessler, who ran a 53.4 quarter last night.

Last year Booker won the 440 yard dash in 51.4 and was a member of the 880 yard relay team which set an IM record in 1:34.7.

Aaron Makes Dessen's Prediction Look Good

NEW YORK (AP) — Hank Aaron of Milwaukee is making his manager's prediction of an improved batting performance look good.

Aaron, two-time National League batting champion, slumped to a .292 average last season. This spring, Braves' skipper Charley Dessen forecast a 40-point increase by his hard-hitting outfielder.

And, after a slow start, Aaron has started to find the range. In last week's games, he hit at a .400 pace, collecting 10 hits in 25 tries and lifting his average 19 points to .331. Including Sunday's games, Aaron was in fifth place in the National League competition. He won the senior circuit title in 1956 and 1959.

DU's relay team, led by anchorman Sam Sobczak, copped the heats in the 880 yard relay 1:38. Omega Psi Phi was right behind as they won their heat with considerable ease in 1:38.2.

Other fraternities to qualify in the relay were Phi Mu Delta (1:38.5), Phi Epsilon Pi (1:39.5), Sigma Pi (1:40.5), and Zeta Beta Tau (1:41.3).

Tonight the finals in the high jump, broad jump, and shot put will be held.

Penn State's golf team completed a successful season Saturday with a 5-2 victory over Cornell for its fifth straight win. The Lion linksmen compiled an 8-4 record this season after a poor start.

Three seniors, Captain John Morton, Bob Rutherford, and Tom Balling ended their golfing careers for the Lions in Saturday's match.

Morton ran into a rough customer in Cornell's Warner Berry. Berry fired a one over par 70 to cop medalist honors and defeat Morton 7 and 5.

Rutherford and Balling fared better. Rutherford defeated George Bickley in a close match 1-up.

Balling rallied from 4 down after the front nine to defeat Don Heppes on the 20th hole.

Rich Gillson, the bellweather in the Lion's streak, defeated Dave Goles 1-up in another close match.

Dave Miller didn't encounter much difficulty in posting a 4 and 3 victory over Ron Curry and Jack Meredith had an easy time defeating Tom Abrams 5 and 4.

Bob Swahn, who was elected captain for the 1962 season, dropped a 3 and 2 decision to Don Reed.

The Lions have Gillson, Swahn, Miller, and Meredith returning next season along with John Bartko, who was ineligible this year, and a solid group of freshmen headed by Joe Baidy.
