

Sub Ruins Stickmen As Raiders Triumph

A substitute midfielder who wasn't good enough to make the Colgate starting lacrosse team scored three goals Saturday against Penn State to hand the Lions a 5-4 loss.

Walt Jones, a 6-1 junior who hasn't started a game for Colgate this season, fired in Colgate's last three scores and wrecked State's bid for a 5-5 record this year.

The loss snapped a three-game Lion winning streak and gave the stickmen a 4-6 slate. Colgate is 10-7.

Following the game it was learned that Dave Erwin, State's captain and an honorable mention All-American last year, was selected to play in the 20th Annual North-South All-Star game to be held June 10 at the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

Erwin has been the bulwark of the Lion's defense this year and is one of seven defensemen selected on the North squad. "Erwin is certainly one of the best defensemen at Penn State since I've coached here," Lion coach Earnie Baer said.

The Lions never led in the Colgate game. The Red Raiders jumped off to an 1-0 lead when Curt Brockelman tallied a goal at 12:34 of the first period. Dick Seelig tied the game at one all with a goal at 1:03 of the second period, but that was

the last time that Colgate wasn't in front.

The Red Raiders got another score and then Jones took over. He moved Colgate to a 3-1 margin and when Gordon Bennett cut the score to 3-2, he promptly scored again.

State battled back with Tom Hayes counting a goal at 14:24 of the third period to make the score 4-3 but Jones tallied again and the Lions were two goals short.

Steve Schrader scored for the Lions at 9:17 of the final frame, closing the gap to 5-4. The last five minutes State peppered the Colgate goalie with shots, but couldn't get the tying score.

Jim Irwin again had a brilliant game in the nets for State, making 17 saves and holding Colgate, a team that had averaged over 10 goals a game, to just five scores. In his last three games, Irwin has held the opposition to an average of three goals.

The Lion freshmen dropped their second match of the year Saturday at Army, 8-1.

Mitch Wapen and Al Harris in doubles were the only frosh winners.

The frosh (1-2) end their season here today against Cornell.

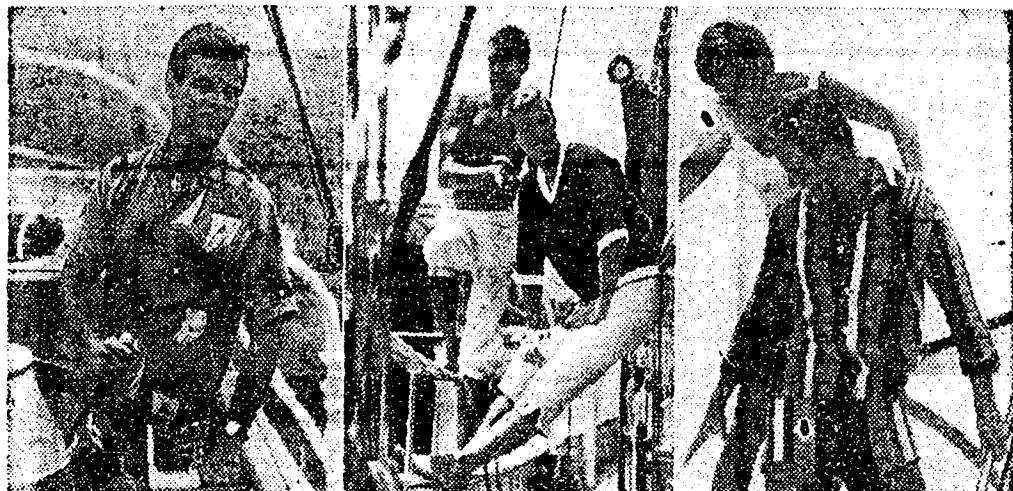
