Students Seek Mexican Relics

Fifteen students from six colleges and universities are getting first-hand, on-the-spot training this summer on an archaeological and anthropological expedition conducted by the University.

The department of sociology and anthropology is conducting a field session in archaeology in Mexico with headquarters at Texcoco, a town with a population of about 8,000 situated 30 miles from Mexico City.

The students attending the field session will spend the entire summer trying to trace the social patterns and agricultural skills of prehistoric Indians in the Valley of Teotihuacan, near the site of the famous Aztec sun and moon temples, northeast of

Mexico City. The students are making surveys and extensive excavations at two sites, as well as a film documenting present-day Indian life in the valley.

Their digging has already uncovered three levels of living complexes, strewn with pottery and artifacts, and a major ceremonial building, according to Dr. William T. Sanders, assistant professor of anthropology and expedition leader.

In the summer of 1960 a preliminary test field session was

carried out with a group of 14 graduate and undergraduate students with repeatedly excellent results. Out of this preliminary session a series of specific projects were defined for this summer's expedition.

The field session is oriented towards two groups of students, majors in anthropology who wish specific training in field techniques, and general students who would like to learn something about archaeological methods and enjoy first hand contact with the Mexican people.

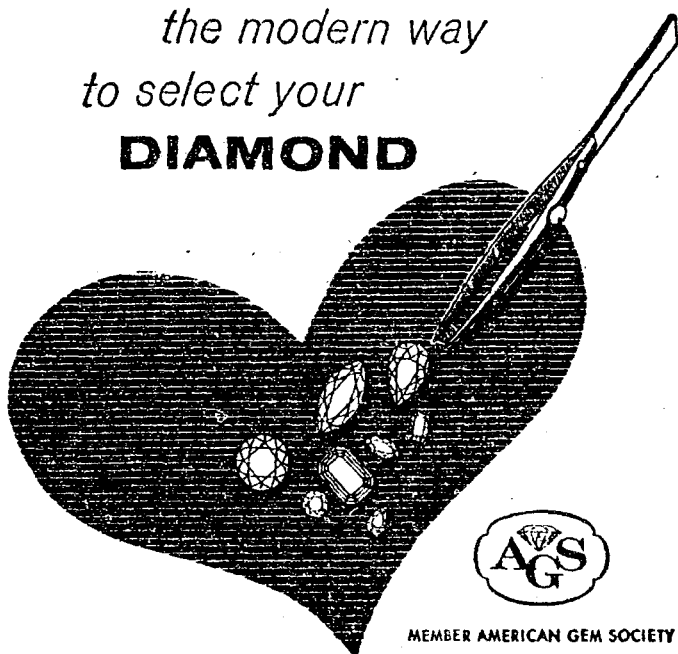
