

# Artist Series to Begin Oct. 7

Henrik Ibsen's famous play "Hedda Gabler" will be the first in the series of outstanding entertainment programs to be offered this year by the University Artist Series.

The play, starring Anne Meacham, is scheduled for two performances in Schwab, Saturday, Oct. 7. Tickets to "Hedda Gabler" and all Artist Series programs are free to students. They may be obtained by presenting matriculation cards at the Hetzel Union desk on various distribution dates later in the term.

As in past years, the Artist Series will bring to the campus artists in the fields of drama, music and ballet.

Friday and Saturday, Oct. 13 and 14, "The Importance of Being Oscar" will be presented in Schwab. The American Ballet Theater is scheduled to appear in Recreation Hall Oct. 29.

Pianist Rosalyn Tureck will give a concert Nov. 5. The Bayanihan Philippine Dance Company will present

Philippine Folk Dances in Rec Hall Nov. 12. The following Sunday the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra featuring Eric Friedman, violinist, will appear in Rec Hall.

The first performance of the winter term will be Jan. 12, for which cellist Janos Starker is scheduled. January 18, I Musici, string orchestra, will give a concert. Sean O'Casey's "Pictures in the Hallway" will be presented by the Cleveland Playhouse Jan. 27 in Schwab.

The Modern Jazz Quartet will appear Feb. 4 in Rec Hall. February 28, the Netherlands Chamber Choir, directed by Felix de Nobel, will sing in Schwab. Pierrette Alarie, a soprano and Leopold Simoneau, tenor, will give a concert March 10 in Schwab.

The two final presentations of the series will be the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, conducted by William Steinberg, in Rec Hall March 31 and violinist Issac Stern who is scheduled to appear in Schwab April 27.

In addition to the Artist Series performances, the University Lecture Series has announced

plans for visiting lecturers during the next three terms.

The first will feature U.S. Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges who will speak Feb. 11, in Schwab. U.S. Senators Hubert Humphrey, D-Minn., and Karl Mundt, R-S. Dak., will appear jointly April 14. Eric Sevaried, CBS news analyst is scheduled to appear in Schwab Feb. 17.

The Lecture Series may also sponsor the appearance of a poet and another speaker and will announce these plans later in the term.

## New Curriculum Added

To meet industry's rapidly expanding need for trained chemical technicians, the University will initiate a two-year associate degree program in chemical technology at the Wyoming Campus this fall.

The new curriculum will provide concentrated, specialized instruction and practical experience in applied chemistry and chemical engineering. It is intended to supply chemistry-related industries with badly needed technical assistants for senior chemists.

# Five Divisions of Outing Club Offer Varied Sports Activities

Some of the more robust students may want to look into the University's Outing Club. Student pioneers have been enjoying this activity for years on this campus.

The club has five divisions — ski, canoe, field and stream, rock climbing and general. Equipment and instruction are provided in all these areas for students who wish them.

The ski division has its own ski tow and slope on Bald Mountain near Boalsburg. Between terms this division has planned a trip to a ski resort.

The canoe division has just made a three week trip to Algonquin Park in Canada. It will also be going on further expeditions in this area.

Field and stream sponsors such activities as hunting, fishing and archery.

The rock climbing division climbs mountains in Centre County and nearby areas. A hike to Mount Nittany will be sponsored Sept. 24.

The general group holds such activities as weekend cabin parties. Included in these weekends are rock climbing expeditions, square dancing and boating.

## Frosh May Get Dink, 'Bible' At BX in HUB

Every freshman begins life at the University with two necessary items—a dink and a handbook.

The place to get both of them is at the Book Exchange located on the ground floor of the Hetzel Union Building.

Tables, which will be set up outside the Book Exchange, will sell these items during Orientation Week.

The BX, which was founded in 1949, was first located in the Temporary Union Building. In 1954 it was moved to its present location in the HUB.

The BX sells everything needed for the classroom.

Since 1956, the BX has been working with the Used Book Agency, which helps students buy and sell used books.

At the beginning of each term the UBA posts a list of the names and prices of the books needed in each course.

Any student may place a book that is on the list in the UBA for sale.

The UBA charges the buyer and seller of each book a handling fee of ten cents.

About 20,000 books are handled yearly.

The BX will be open from 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. each day.

The UBA will accept books from this Tuesday until next Tuesday.

Used books will be sold from Friday until Sept. 30.
