## Debating Squad Adds Discussions, Audience Debates

The Men's Debating team has expanded its forensic activities this year to include audience participation debates, public debates, and discussion sessions before Centre County civic groups and local organizations.

This year, as in previous years, the men's team will hold both varsity and novice tournaments. Varsity debates will be held with Wayne State, Rochester, Temple, William and Mary, Boston, and Holy Cross.

Novice tournaments are planned with Westminster, Duquesne, St. Vincent, Pittsburgh and Dickinson.

Persons interested in participating in the Men's Debate Team should contact Mr. Ronald R. Nicolson, instructor in speech, in 312 Sparks before Oct. 7.

The debate team is sponsoring several one and two credit forensic courses with the Speech Department. Previous experience in debating is not necessary to enroll in these courses, Nicolson said.

### 3 Colleges Plan Mixer

The Education, Chemistry-Physics, and Mineral Industries Colleges will hold a mixer from 8 to 9:30 tonight in the Hetzel Union Ballroom.

The keynote speaker for the annual encampment held this year at the Civil Engineering Camp explained the role of the administration in dealing with the fraternities. He stressed that the fraternities have a big responsibility to the administration in view of this freedom.

Six workshops discussed IFC problems and made plans for the coming year. These workshops included rushing problems, scholastic problems, IFC rules and policy, public relations, fraternity activities and interfraternity council structure.

Richard Pigossi, IFC president, called the encampment "the best ever." However, he said, due to lack of time, the workshop reports will not be given until the next IFC meeting scheduled for early October.

Speakers at the encampment in addition to Zerman included, Dean of Men, Frank J. Simes; Wilmer E. Wise, assistant dean of men in charge of fraternity affairs; Laurence H. Lattman, chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Student Affairs; representatives from the Social Security office and the Bureau of Labor and Industry, and the Borough Manager.

# TIM Social Events Planned for Year

Town Independent Men is an organization which governs and provides social activities for the 4000 non-fraternity men who live off campus.

The governing body of the organization is TIM Council composed of 26 members-at-large, four officers and a non-voting parliamentarian.

The TIM Council has planned for this year a Las Vegas night on Oct. 21, two ice-skating parties at the University rink, a Roaring Twenties dance on Jan. 27, two mixed swims and a donkey softball game in the spring.

Legalized "gambling" will come to the campus when TIM holds Las Vegas night in the Hetzel Union ballroom. Roulette wheels, dice tables and poker games will flourish with TIM-employed croupiers paying off winners with authentic Las Vegas souvenirs.

TIM also sponsors educational films in the Hetzel Union assembly room each Wednesday and a bluebook file in its office, 203 HUB.

The organization's downtown housing committee is conducting an investigation of borough housing regulations in an effort to eliminate substandard and unsafe conditions in the apartments rented to students.

Long range plans include a TIM recreation and social center, bridge and dancing lessons for independents, and cooperation with the borough in obtaining intramural facilities separate from the University.

Elections for the TIM Council will be held Oct. 10. Candidates must be nominated by presenting a petition signed by 20 town independent men. Previous members who desire to run may

have their name placed on the ballot automatically.

All candidates must have a 2.0 All-University average and, if running for the first time, a student must have at least three terms remaining at the University.

## Article by Golatz Outlines Labor Education

The growth of the labor education institutes for steelworkers, which began in 1946, is outlined in an article by Helmut J. Golatz, associate professor of industrial relations at the University, which was published in the July issue of the Pennsylvania Business Survey.

Professor Golatz writes that last summer more than 4000 steelworkers attended programs at 23 colleges and universities and that the program pioneered by the University today represents the most ambitious experiment in union-university cooperation in the United States.

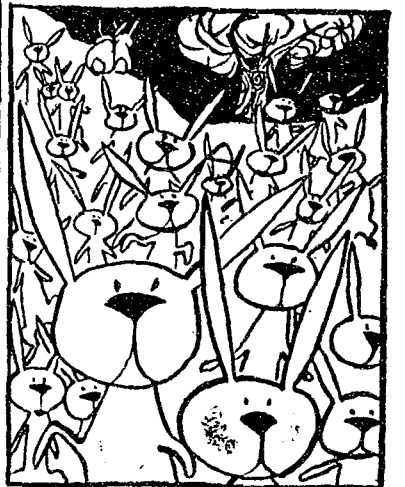
