

# 4 Divisions of WRA Plan Athletic Events

WRA, the Women's Recreation Association, offers a program of athletic activities to all women students.

The association is divided into four major divisions: the executive governing board, the club program, the intramural program and a special events program.

The club program offers students opportunity for participation and instruction in athletic activities ranging from basketball to dancing and fencing. Twelve clubs operate under WRA.

Each club functions under its own constitution which must be approved by the main governing board. The clubs are required to keep their own attendance lists and they must submit a yearly report of their activities to the Club Activities Chairman.

The WRA intramural program offers competition in nine different sports and activities including bridge, bowling, swimming and volleyball.

Participating in the intramurals are teams from each sorority, and from units of all the women's residence halls. Arrangements for the intramural contests are made through contact with the intramural chairman of each unit.

WRA also sponsors, under the Special Events program, such activities as Co-Rec night, a planned program of recreational activities including individual and team sports and dancing for both men and women.

Every Friday and Saturday evening from 7 to 9 and Saturday afternoon from 1 to 4 WRA sponsors Open House Playnight. At these times White Hall is open to all women students who wish to use the sports facilities located in the building.

WRA also features "Sportsdays" at various times throughout the year. These days each feature a particular sport.

A "Sportsday" in the fall will feature field hockey, while winter "Sportsdays" are highlighted by

such activities as basketball, volleyball, badminton, etc. In the spring such activities as golf and softball are sponsored.

WRA also has a cabin located on the Tussey Ridge Mountain which may be used by the various clubs upon payment of a fee.

In the spring, WRA holds its annual awards banquet at which time trophies are presented to the winning team in each of the intramural tournaments.

## Players to Hold Tryouts for Show

Tryouts for the first Penn State Players production, "The Cave Dwellers", will be held from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday in the Little Theater in Old Main.

The play will open at Center Stage Oct. 27 and will run through Dec. 2. Performance will be given Friday and Saturday nights.

The Cave Dwellers, by William Saroyan, calls for a cast of seven men and three women. Anyone may try out for the parts.

Those interested in working on behind-the-scenes crews should also report to the Tuesday and Wednesday tryouts, Jim Dewsnap, Theatre Arts publicity manager said.

The play will be directed by Kelly Yeaton, associate professor of theatre arts.

For the first time this year season tickets will be sold on five productions and a season ticket will cost \$4.00. The regular admission price is \$1.25.

# Marine Unit Will Present Halftime Drill

A 78-man marching unit from the U.S. Marine Corps Drum and Bugle Corps will provide the halftime entertainment at the football opener against Navy this afternoon.

The unit, from Washington, D.C., will present a military drill performance similar to the one it has presented in Cotton Bowl and Gator Bowl appearances.

The Penn State Block "S" Club, 704 strong, will present its first flashcard show at today's game.

The Club, which is starting its second year of half-time entertainment, will try its first moving stunt this afternoon.

A torpedo will move across a white field to hit a blue Navy ship. Other stunts will include

an anchor, PSU, and S-T-A-T-E. All students in the flashcard section should take their positions in the stands at least 10 minutes before game time, Robert Duffner, president of the club, said. Pre-game activities will feature

more than 600 midshipmen from the Naval Academy, who will parade into the stadium at 12:15 p.m. accompanied by the Academy Brigade Staff, Academy Drum and Bugle Corps and a Color Guard.

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
