

WDFM Broadcasts Music, Local Events

WDFM, student operated FM radio station, begins its eighth year of broadcasting this term with programming plans ranging from campus "election specials" to Metropolitan Opera performances.

Most students without FM radios will be able to hear WDFM only from 8 to 10 p.m. when the station broadcasts in conjunction with WMAJ, State College radio. However, the student station has tentative plans for FM broadcasts daily from 3:30 p.m. to midnight.

Almost a dozen staffs make up the entire WDFM operation. These range from announcing and news writing to engineering. Richard Kellman, chief announcer said.

New students wishing to work on WDFM may attend an open house at 7:30 Wednesday evening in 121 Sparks. There are positions open on all of the staffs, Kellman said, but the station is primarily interested in developing a larger news writing staff this term, Kellman said.

The present schedule of broadcasts includes the nightly simulcasts with WMAJ, two hours of classical music on FM only, nightly from 10 to 12, and from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

The station has tentative plans for broadcasting Metropolitan Opera music on Saturday afternoon.

Along with these regularly scheduled programs will be "specials" broadcast throughout the year concerning various events of local interest including SGA election campaign debates, lectures, and musical events such as concerts.

Application blanks for the staff of WDFM are now available in 304 Sparks.

Chaplain to Speak In Schwab Service

Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University Chaplain, will give the sermon at the University Chapel Service of the fall term at 10:55 tomorrow in Schwab.

His topic will be "To Enlighten the Misery of Existence."

The chapel choir directed by Willa Taylor will sing Psalm 28 by Alan Hovhaness. George Ceiga, University organist, will play selections by Benedetto Marcello, Joseph Rheinberger, and Andre Campra.

The Protestant service of worship will be held at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eisenhower Chapel. Rev. Barrett Rudd, assistant director of the University Christian Association, will give the sermon. The chapel choir, directed by James Beach, will sing "Psalm 4" arranged by Robert Shaw.

Committee to List Qualified Tutors

The SGA Tutoring Service offers participants in the program a three-fold opportunity, Ruth Falk, Chairman of the committee, said yesterday.

Miss Falk listed these three opportunities as a way to earn extra spending money, a way for education students to practice teaching, and a way to help other students before their academic problem becomes hopeless.

The committee is now in the process of compiling a list of capable tutors. To be included on the list the only requirement is to have achieved either an A or B in the course the student wishes to tutor.

Miss Falk went on to explain that any interested and qualified students may sign up to tutor today through Friday at the main desk or at the booth on the ground floor of the Hetzel Union today through Friday.

Evening Tests Out

Evening exams have been discontinued for the time being, John E. Miller, head of scheduling said yesterday. This year large classes such as Physics 235, Math 41, and Chemistry 1, which in previous years have scheduled examinations in the evenings, will hold their examinations in the regularly scheduled class period, Miller said.

The large number of evening classes and the difficulty in scheduling has made it impossible to conduct tests in the evening.


