# Workshop Suggests Town Building Code

(This is the second of a series of articles on the recommendations made by the six workshops of the SGA Encampment held September 14-16.)

A building code designed to set minimum standards for health, sanitation and safety in town rooming houses should be enacted by the Borough Council according to a recommendation of the Encampment Off-Campus Problems Workshop.

The workshop suggested that SGA establish a new committee or assign to an existing committee the task of working with the Borough Council to develop such a code.

The workshop also recommended that the list of houses that were approved in last spring's housing survey be made available to the students.

Both of these recommendations were made after consulting with State College Mayor Roy B. Anthony, Borough Council President Lawrence Perez and a representative of the Dean of Men's office.

The workshop devoted a good deal of time to discussing complaints of high prices in town stores and shops.

It was felt that the Book Exchange should be expanded to sell all items that are essential to the education of the students such as books and supplies.

The workshop did not believe that items such as clothing should be handled by the BX because students not wishing to pay the prices charged in State College may purchase these items in their home town.

In discussing sanitary conditions in town eating establishments with the mayor and Borough Council president, the workshop learned that a full-time biology professor serves as the health inspector for the borough.

Although state sanitation laws do exist, the borough health inspector apparently follows no established regulations for inspecting town eating establishments.

Thus, the workshop recommended that SGA work with the borough council to establish borough sanitation regulations for town eating establishments within the framework of existing state laws.

## Ed Council Plans Revisions

The Education Student Council took steps Tuesday night to improve communication between the council and the education students which it represents, president Barbara Johnson said last night.

Under the newly-planned system, each council member will represent one residence hall, Miss Johnson said. She said that the council member would be responsible for keeping in touch with the education students in his hall and should inform them of student council events.

In addition, she explained that council members would solicit suggestions and opinions from their constituencies on the various aspects of the council. Council members would also encourage education students in their halls to sign up for council

committees, thus introducing students outside the council to committee work, Miss Johnson said.

College councils have been criticized in the past for lack of communication with students, Miss Johnson said, adding that the education council is the first to attempt to remedy the situation.

Carol Connelly, junior in secondary education from New Castle, was appointed chairman of the committee to organize the new system.

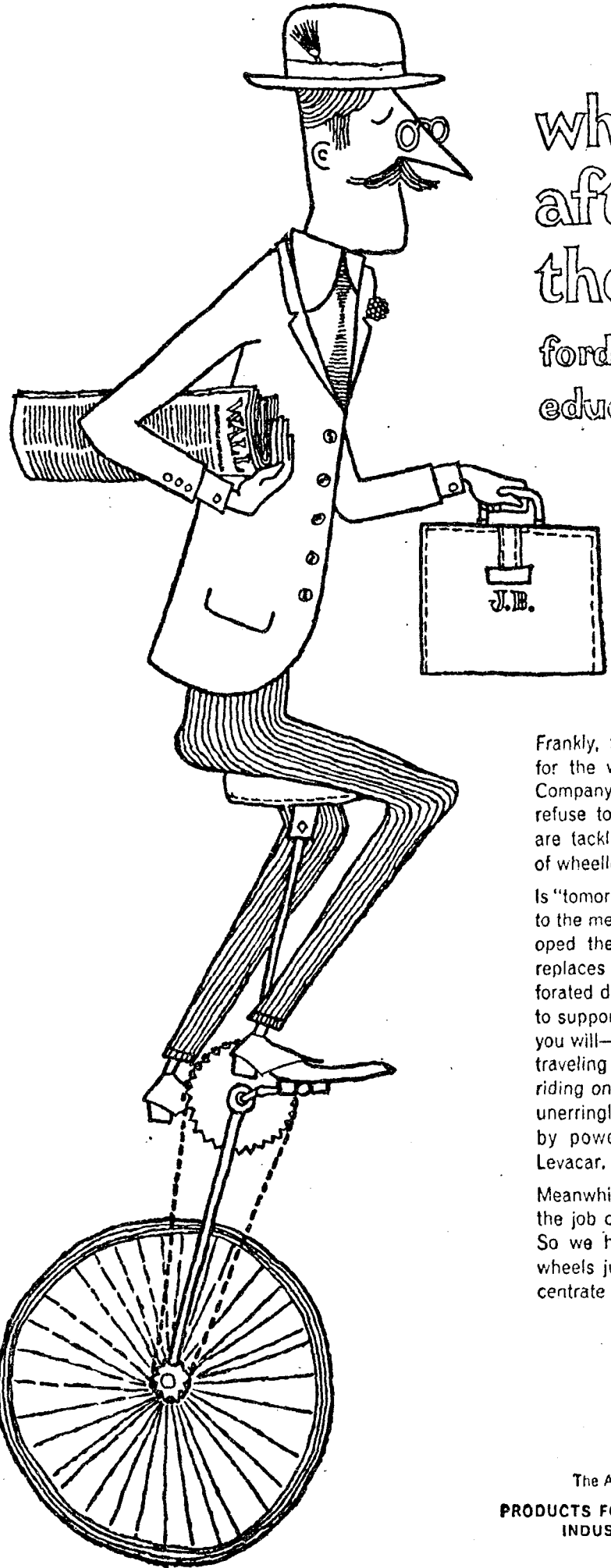
