Jose Quintero and Theodore Mann are the producers of the play which is currently playing off-Broadway in New York.

## Chilly Weather Will Continue

The coldest air mass of the season was expected to produce widespread frost in the western two-thirds of Pennsylvania early today.

Frost or freezing temperatures is predicted for all sections of the commonwealth tonight.

The large arctic air mass responsible for this chilly weather originated over Central Canada several days ago, and moved steadily southeastward across the central United States Tuesday and Wednesday.

Its leading edge passed this area around noon yesterday.

Today should be clear and cool with bright sunshine. The highest temperature will be near 61 degrees.

Clear, cold weather is indicated for tonight and a low of 35 is expected.

Tomorrow should be partly cloudy, windy and warmer with a chance of showers developing by night.

Nina Brown, administrative assistant for the Artists' Series, said last night that this change was necessary because "Hedda Gabler" has cancelled its entire tour.

Mrs. Brown also announced the other 12 performances for the coming season, including the productions for evenings which were previously unscheduled.

Michael Mac Liammoir will give two performances in "The Importance of Being Oscar" on Oct. 13 and 14. The series will then present the American Ballet Theatre on Oct. 29.

November will bring three productions to the campus. First Rosalyn Tureck, pianist, will appear at Schwab Auditorium Nov. 5. One week later the Bayanihan Philippine Dance Company will present Philippine Folk Dances and on the following Sunday, Eric Friedman, violinist, will appear with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra in Recreation Hall.

Janos Starker, cellist, will open the winter term series on Jan. 12. I Musici, string orchestra, follows on Jan. 18 with their performance in Schwab.

The Cleveland Playhouse will carry the third dramatic play of the season to campus when they

# September Weather Sets Local Record

Despite the arrival of the coldest weather of the young fall season yesterday, this month will be the warmest September in State College weather history.

A persistent heat wave, that caused temperatures to average nearly 10 degrees above seasonal normals during the first two weeks of the month, was the main factor in producing the record.

Since weather records began in State College, 77 years ago, the highest average temperature for September was 68 degrees. That average occurred in 1900, 1930 and 1931.

This year's average will probably be 69 degrees, which is 6.5 degrees above the September normal of 62.5 degrees.

Temperatures climbed into the 80's during each of September's first 14 days except for the ninth when a maximum of 79 was recorded.

After a six day cool spell, tem-

peratures again climbed well above normal on Sept. 22, and they remained well above seasonal values through Monday.

Hurricanes Carla and Esther both threatened to bring considerable rain to this area during the month, but neither produced much. The total precipitation for the month equals 2.15 inches which is three-quarters of an inch below the normal amount for September.

The presence of tropical air through most of the month and the lengthening nights combined to produce fog on 14 individual

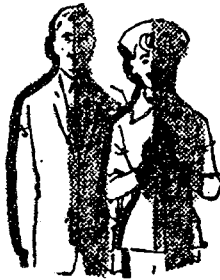

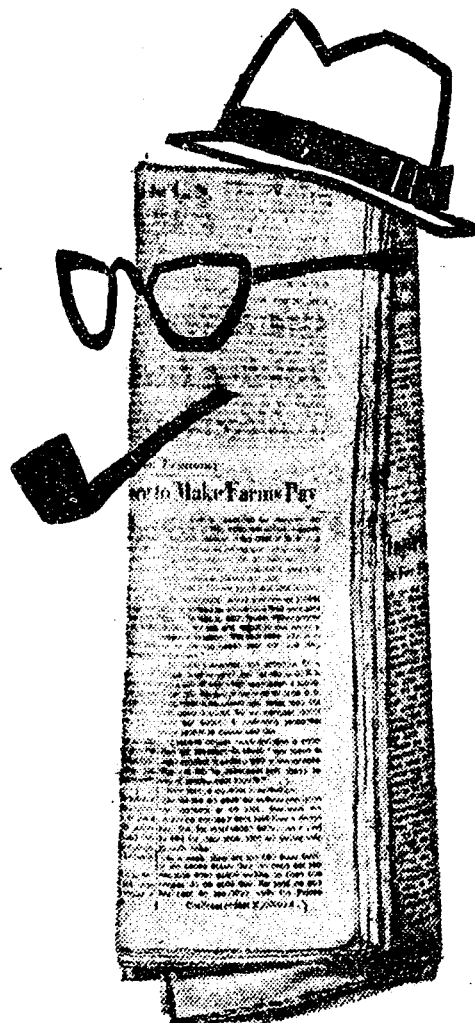
