

Army Crushes BU With 2nd Half Surge

Future Penn State football opponents didn't fare too well over the weekend with only three teams showing wins while five others suffered losses.

California, Pitt, Boston University, West Virginia and Holy Cross went down to defeat while Army, Syracuse and Maryland were victorious.

However, in defense of the "Lion foes," it must be admitted that four of them faced each other. Army, State's opponent in two weeks, knocked over this week's opponent, Boston U., 31-7, and Syracuse defeated West Virginia, 29-14.

In the battle of the Lions' next two opponents, Army used a strong second half to crush Boston U. The Terriers had held the Cadets to a 14-7 lead in the first half, but Army's second half surge was too much for the Terriers.

The Cadets rushed Boston

U's line for 249 yards while holding the Terriers to just eight yards. The Army defense was so strong that it held Boston U. to a minus 54 yards rushing in the second half.

Syracuse had more trouble with West Virginia than expected and had to rely on the passing arm of quarterback Dave Sarette to pick up the win. Sarette hurled three touchdown passes after the Mountaineers had ganged up to halt Syracuse's big star Ernie Davis for only 35 yards in 14 tries.

The Pitt Panthers, State's final foe of the season, built up a first half 13-3 lead over highly respected Baylor, and then watched the Bears fire two fourth-quarter touchdowns to pull a 16-13 victory out of the fire.

Injury plagued California held the nation's number one team, Iowa, to a 14-7 halftime lead, but then gave way in the second half as the Hawkeyes turned on the power, 28-7.

Holy Cross opened its season on a sour note by dropping a 20-6 decision to Villanova. It was the third straight upset for Villanova.

Maryland made itself a leading contender for the Atlantic Coast Conference title by nipping Clemson, 24-21, in the closing seconds of play with a field goal.
