

# Choir Will Sing Tour Excerpts In Chapel Service

The 1961 European Chapel Choir will present selections from its tour at the 10:55 a.m. service tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

The 70-member choir, directed by James W. Beach, will sing: "Die Mit Traenen", by Schein; "O Magnun Mysterium", by Victoria; "Christus Factus Est", by Bruckner; "Surrexit Pastor Bonus", by Lassus; "Te Deum", by Schuman; "Let Down the Bars, O Death", by Barber; and "Praise the Lord", by Creston.

Genevieve Dilts, associate director of the University Christian Association, will give the sermon for the Protestant service of worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. Miss Dilts will speak on the "Three Pictures of the Prodigal."

"The Last Angry Man" will be shown at 8 p.m. tonight at the Hillel Foundation. A lox and bagel brunch will be held at 10:30 tomorrow morning. At 8 p.m. tomorrow Dr. Aaron Druckman, professor of philosophy, will conduct the TV forum on "Castro, Cuba and Communism."

Dr. David N. Freedman, professor of Hebrew and Old Testament literature at the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, will be the guest minister at the 9:45 and 10:15 a.m. services tomorrow at the State College Presbyterian Church. At 6:30 p.m., the Westminster Foundation will hold a discussion on "Protestant, Catholic, and Jew" with Taylor Stevenson, Dean Robert Tschan and Clifford Nelson representing the respective faiths.

Sunday morning seminar and coffee will be held at 9:30 a.m. at the Lutheran Student Association. Dr. Luther Harshbarger, University chaplain, will speak on "Contemporary Issues in Light of the Gospel" at the weekly forum at 6:30 p.m.

The Roger William Foundation will hold a retreat this afternoon and evening at Watts Lodge. Those planning to attend will meet at 2 p.m. at the Hetzel Union desk.

Rev. Nelson Frank will speak on "Harvest Reflections" for the annual Harvest Home Sunday at the 9:15 and 10:45 a.m. services at St. Paul's Methodist Church. Wesley Foundation will hold a Sunday morning seminar at 9 a.m. and Bible study at 6:30 p.m.

# University To Be Held Responsible For Additional Sewage Plant Costs

The entire financial burden and responsibility for providing additional facilities at the University's sewage treatment plant, as ordered by the state earlier in the week, appeared yesterday to rest solely upon the University.

The borough, which contributes approximately 50 per cent of the sewage inflow at the plant, indicated yesterday that it had no responsibility, financially or otherwise in the plant.

"We are merely a customer of the University," Borough Man-

ager Robert V. Edwards said yesterday morning.

Last week the General State Authority backed out of a \$500,000 project which would have added to the present facilities. The GSA said that they were withdrawing the funds because they did not want to get involved in the present controversy.

Estimates on the costs of providing new facilities have varied from \$500,000 for one plan to \$5 million for another.

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
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
