

Senate Committee Disciplines 2 Men

One student was placed on suspended suspension and another withdrew from the University as a result of action taken by the Senate Sub-committee on Discipline last week.

A junior in arts and letters who caused a disturbance at the football game with Navy was placed on suspended sus-

pension, Daniel R. Leasure, assistant to the dean of men, said.

A student on suspended suspension may be suspended from the University immediately by the dean of men if any further misconduct occurs.

The student, a minor, was intoxicated, Leasure said. The disturbance started, Leasure explained, when the student purchased a pennant from a vendor at the game and then took three others.

When the student was caught by a campus patrolman he was very uncooperative and used abusive language, Leasure said.

The second student, a sophomore in business administration, was caught stealing while staying at a fraternity, Leasure said. The student was a transfer student and living in the fraternity under the 3-week fraternity tryout program, he explained.

Fraternity members reported that he stole \$12 in cash, two shirts, plus a number of small items, such as a pair of socks and a shoehorn, Leasure said.

The student was immediately

referred to the University psychiatrist because he "demonstrated unusual behavior," Leasure said.

The psychiatrist reported that the student did not have a character disorder but did demonstrate a high degree of immaturity, Leasure reported.

Because of this report, Leasure said, the sub-committee decided to give the student an opportunity to withdraw from the University without any formal disciplinary action being taken against him.

The student accepted the sub-committee's recommendations and withdrew from the University, he said.

Dr. Barkev Y. Bakamjian, assistant professor of physics, has resigned.

He will accept a position as a mathematician with the Senior Research Project of the Schlumberger Well Surveying Corp. in Ridgefield, Conn.

Bernreuter said students attending the University have a "big investment" in their grades and a recess would be too great a "risk" on their part.

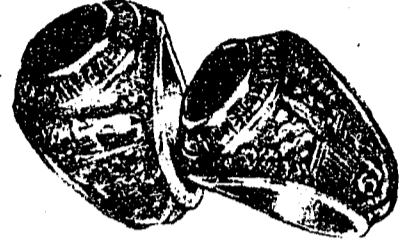

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University Discontinues Parking on Shortlidge
